...Editorial...

THE CHANGING YEARS

Life is not static. Despite how much we wish things to remain as they are they will change with time. That is a rule of nature—a rule of life—and a good one.

Without it, progress would be unknown, monotony would smother our existence and life would be unbearable. Instead time changes all of us from day to day. We are constantly growing older and one last to catch this change too—not only with resignation but with contentment.

As the late Dr. Joshua L. Liebman wrote, "The truth is we die every day a little without fear, our skins change; the cells in our hands and in our brains perish and are reborn; our whole life is strewn with the bones of hopes discarded and dreams outgrown. We change and die every dawn and every sunset without dread."

Dr. Liebman knew that the change of growing old is nothing to fear—that the transition we call death is a long time project which actually begins the day we are born.

This subject of old age is fast becoming of great importance to Americans. Today there are more old people in this country than ever before. The average life expectancy has increased nearly 20 years since 1900. For men it rose from 48 to 65 and for women, from 51 to 70.

An increasing older population poses many problems too. Thousands of additional Americans are annually reaching the age when such diseases as cancer take their heaviest toll. To protect those oldsters as well as the thousands of youngsters who die of cancer, a great deal must be accomplished and at once.

Recently the American Cancer Society revealed that the cancer death rate has taken a serious upswing, far greater than had been anticipated. One reason for this is increased longevity. People have been saved from the infectious diseases, rampant in earlier life, only to find the spectre of cancer awaiting them later.

But this change has brought about another more encouraging one. The American people have been thoroughly aroused about cancer and they are beginning to put their resources in science and education to work to conquer this disease.

The best scientific brains in the country now are trying to find out what causes cancer and a vast program of education is under way to tell us that cancer, if detected early, frequently can be cured with surgery and radiation.

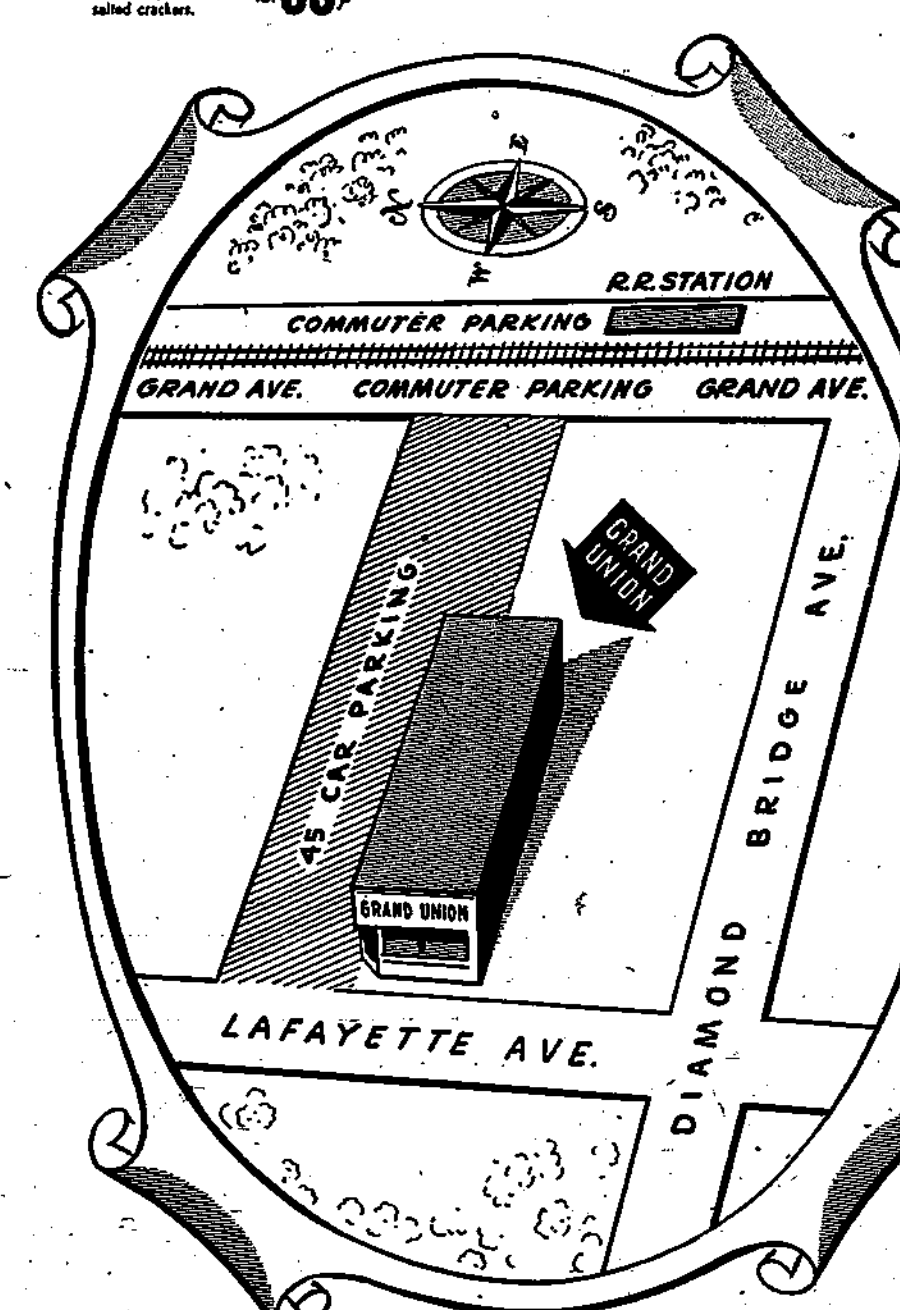

It is the beginning of a depression. Or is it recession? Or perhaps you prefer the newly-coined "deflationism" to describe the current slowdown in the rate of business from the postwar all-time high the United States has enjoyed.

Whatever its name, the situation, with its attendant growing unemployment, offers definite signs of economic decline from the unprecedented prosperity of the last few years and leaves no doubt that the time has come to effectuate some of the postwar planning that was done on such a large scale by 30 many persons and organizations during the war years. The foreboding manifested then should stand us in good stead now.

In connection, it is interesting to review what the American Road Builders' Association had to say as early as February, 1942, when its "Plan for Postwar Roads and Jobs" was published. For the construction of the plan, the association (as the ideal way of meeting, quickly, and using employment opportunities as a means of recovery) should be ready to start when the slowdown in present activities begins, as evidenced by unemployment. This, the plan went on to point out, "may be immediately after the war or it may be after the brief period of inflation that always follows a major war."

The fact that the "brief period of inflation" has been so long continued for upwards of three years after cessation of hostilities does not detract from the wisdom of utilizing highway construction as an effective means of combating unemployment. Nor should we overlook the other sound economic principles upon which the ARBA Plan was based: (1) employment; (2) internal income; (3) value money; (4) government income (taxes); and (5) national debt.

Public and private construction are and always have been major forces in maintaining full employment and a continuing prosperity. Data gathered in the research leading up to the ARBA Plan show clearly that as the construction industry goes, so goes the nation, prosperity-wise. WASHINGTON WEEK

Washington, D. C.—The financial picture for the nation is getting pretty thin. That is the consensus of both Republicans and Democrats financial writers on the Hill.

More and more the reasons are being brought forth in both houses of Congress as the spending continues to give evidence that President Truman's 1950 fiscal budget actually will be closer to \$50 billion than the \$42 billion demand he originally sent to Congress.

Here are some of the points being expressed in solemn tones by top-flight thinkers on the Hill: (1) Government departments are not releasing estimates showing an anticipated drop in national income— which, of course, means a drop in government revenue.

(2) Official figures show unemployment reaching a dangerous level, dangerous because of the possibility of a drop in national income, which, of course, means a drop in government revenue.

(3) Continued demands for government spending by administration sources to bolster the Democratic case in the November elections in 1950.

And what has happened? Little or no hope is held by the administration for the future. It is not a good sign when the administration is not releasing estimates showing an anticipated drop in national income— which, of course, means a drop in government revenue.

Production was at capacity through 1948 and cannot be exceeded. Record acreage was tilled with record crops at record prices in 1948. This has made possible the \$225 billion national income, highest in history.

What faces huge deficit? From this national income came federal revenues of \$42 billion. This is about the amount of Mr. Truman's original budget for next year. A drop in income means a corresponding deficit.

Example: One expert foresees a national income in 1949 of no more than \$195 billion, a drop of \$30 billion. This would mean a drop of about \$5,000,000,000 in revenue and about that much deficit—not counting the vast expenditures planned by the administration beyond the \$42 billion budget.

Whatever the deficit—and Mr. Truman says we are going to have one this fiscal year despite the fact that 1948—will be an added loan on the national debt which is now \$232 billion. A THREAT TO FAMILY NEWSPAPERS

There are bills pending in the House and Senate of the United States which if enacted into laws would hit the publishers of Family Weekly and Daily Newspapers in communities of from 3,000 to 5,000 population, below the belt. Congressman J. W. Mack of the State of Washington has gone to bat for the publishers of Family Newspapers. He has taken up the question of price boosts of publishers, postage rates with the Post Office Department and he says that the rates that have been asked for in the bills before Congress are a serious threat to publishers.

The present rate of newspaper postage for city delivery within a county is 1 cent per copy. The proposed rate is 4 cents per copy. Rural delivery within the county is free. The proposed rate is 1 cent.

These figures indicate that the proposed rates would add up to a boost of 500 per cent and probably 700 per cent.

In the opinion of Congressman Mack more increases of rates on editions of newspapers carrying a profitable amount of advertising could give postal authorities the power to revoke the second class mail rate to publishers.

The statement made in the House of Representatives in protest of this threat to Weekly Newspapers prompted Congressman Mack to notify the publishers of Washington State just what they are up against. He says that the high cost of reading would be as disastrous as the high cost of living.

Our publishers everywhere are up against a real proposition that the lawmakers declare "would weaken the 10,000 Weekly Newspapers of our country and bring financial difficulties to most of them."
