ANNUAL CONFERENCE SET BY HAWTHORNE CHURCH ROUTE 208

Speakers representing mission-ary efforts in many parts of the world are on the program for the annual missionary conference of the Hawthorne Gospel Church, Route 208. Opening with a day of prayer on Wednesday, the conference will continue through Sunday. Exhibits of missionary interest from many lands will be on display, along with prize-win-ning projects by children of the Sunday School.

Topic recorded messages sent for the occasion by the church missionary families will enable the local congregation to learn of the latest developments in their fields of service.

The special fund program is one phase of the year-round em-phasis on missions characterizing the church, which has a month-ly commitment of \$2,450.60 for the support of 25 missionaries serving in Peru, Colombia, the Congo, Kenya, Tanganyika, the Niger, Mexico, the Netherlands, and the United States. During 1962, \$4,450.49 was disbursed through the Missionary Fund by the Hawthorne Gospel Church.

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THREE COMMISSIONERS FILE PETITIONS FOR RE-ELECTION; MacFARLAN CAMPAIGN MGR.

Petitions for reelection were filed Wednesday in the borough clerk's office by Mayor Louis Bay II, Commissioners John G. Rozema and James A. Kirkman. The three incumbents are running as a team under the designation of "For Good Government." The commissioners' election is May 14.

Their campaign manager, Malcolm MacFarlan, said yesterday that the petitions consisted of several hundred names.

"The large number of signatures bodes well for the mayor and commissioners in the coming election," MacFarlan stated. "It is an indication that the residents of Hawthorne are well-satisfied with the manner in which their government is run. Hawthorne is a quiet, stable community with a low tax rate accompanied by municipal services which come much closer to the residents than in other communities."

MacFarlan said there is a large enough list of people who wish to be elected to the borough council to make a contest in Hawthorne.

"It is a tribute to the commissioners that so many people want to live in our borough of Hawthorne," MacFarlan stated. "It is also a tribute to the residents who have cooperated in making Hawthorne a pleasant town in which to live."

A contribution will not be a donation. It actually will be an investment for the health and safety of our families."

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Fire Chief Re-Elected For Fourth Year Term

Fire Chief Louis J. Bay was re-elected Tuesday night to a second consecutive four-year term. The three-year term of the department head narrowed to two with Bay defeating Vincent Lane, former assistant chief of fire.

Bay, a cousin of Mayor Louis Bay II, was challenged by Lane and Howard Roughgarden, assistant fire chief of Co. 1. A department official said 114 volun-teer firemen were eligible to cast votes in the election.

Bay surpassed the required 68 votes to officially win the election by three.

He has been a member of the volunteer fire department for 22 years. He has served in all ranks from second lieutenant to chief.

Chief Bay served as instructor of Co. 3's rookie school for more than 10 years. He was elected re-elected for five two-year terms.

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Peter Sandfort of Garden State Farms Questions Agencies' Use of \$120,000

Pete Sandfort of Garden State Farms has raised the question of whether the Department of Agriculture's use of \$120,000 to study milk costs will result in another attempt to "take up" changes in consumer buying habits and hurt the milk industry in New Jersey.

Sandfort questioned the state agency's \$120,000 appropriation to a New York City management consultant firm in a letter to Secretary of Agriculture Phillip M. Murphy, sent in reply to the secretary's request for cooperation in the cost survey. Sandfort said the Middle Atlantic Conference had completed and returned questionnaires for each of its stores to the New York City firm.

Citing shifts from home delivery to store sales of milk, the going to facilitate containers and different pricing policies in competitive markets across the country, Sandfort said "any study aimed at changing these things is aimed at damaging these things."

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There is plenty of room for differences of opinion as to what should be done about the spread of the virus for and wide.

A perfect example is the policy of tightening up on expensive court-appealing. This, announced months ago, was given widespread approval. The Service, crestfallen, was about to move in on people who had been hitting it up on yachts, in luxury hotels, in hunting lodges, in night clubs, etc., at the expense of the rest of us. And the government would therefore gain legitimate revenue that had been lost to it.

THE RARE BYRD

Harry Flood Byrd, Virginia apple-grower, newspaper publisher, former Governor and now U.S. Senator, died at his home in Washington, D.C., at the age of 73, after a long illness.

Byrd was born in 1890 in the town of New Market, Va., and spent his childhood on his family's apple farm. He attended the University of Virginia and served in the U.S. Army during World War I.

Byrd was a member of the National Press Club and the National Association of Broadcasters. He was also a member of the U.S. Senate from 1945 to 1957.

Responding to the Vice President's greeting, "Mr. Senator," he replied: "To this day, I am the most loyal New Dealer in the Democratic Party. We advocated immediate and drastic reductions in governmental expenditures and elimination of useless commissions . . . There's not much left of the original New Deal plan."

Several packets nasturtium seeds—for aphids. Apple growers will find that plenty of nasturtiums planted around each tree will spoil the taste of the sap from an aphid's point of view.

Note: Quantities of the above requirements will vary widely with acreage, nature of crops and whether you get ten planted or not. But you'd better start collecting now. Spring fever may be here before you can get these cucumbers peeled.

Prior to 1962, two other agencies received commissions. They are: Harry Kirkman who has since died and Charles Miles retired."

"It goes further than that. The staff of 10 people, worked hard to secure a lower fire rate for the borough. We now have a Class 'C' fire rating for industry, the lowest of any community in Passaic County except the three cities which paid fire departments. This home owners' policy rating is as low as that of the three cities and lower than any of the other 12 suburban Passaic County municipalities."

"Other towns with good fire departments, as mine is, are asking how to go about getting similar low fire ratings which saves money for the taxpayers. Yes, the Raymond Rhodes Agency does handle this town. A business man who has since died and played a part in saving the rate of the community was sitting in his fire insurance office. For this he was sitting by candidates who are straitened to find losses because there are none."

Rhodes said as the campaign progresses, there will be further elaboration on the process made in the borough and the incentive in the opponent's campaign.
