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

UNTIL WE LEARNED BETTER

Until we learned better, we used to mix wood and steel in our car It was the best way to make bodies—then. But the state of the art bodies and wheels. has advanced.

Of course, it is more expensive to make an all-steel body than to make a wooden frame and nail steel panels on to it. The all-steel body is more expensive—to us, but not to you. By all odds, then, steel bodies seem preferable. Wheels also have become all-steel. 



UNITED REPUBLICANS' PICNIC

Additional Facts Demonstrating Why an Electric Rate Agitation at This Time Is Unnecessary and Contrary to Present Governmental Policies and to the Welfare of the State

For the further information of the thousands of Public Service Electric and Gas Company customers who use electricity in their homes, these additional facts, all having a distinct bearing upon rates, are presented, supplementing those which appeared in an advertisement in these columns the last

The position of the Electric Department of the company, viewed from the angle of increasing financial burdens, has undergone a radical change since January 1 of this year when the last reduction in electric rates was put into effect-a reduction, incidentally, resulting in an annual saving to customers of \$1,750,000.

In this seven month period, the gross revenues of Public Service, in all its departments, have decreased \$7,000,000. The proportion of this decrease in gross borne by the Electric Department is more than \$2,750,000. There has also been imposed upon the Electric Depart-

ment of Public Service the three per cent. tax on sales of electric current which the Federal Government has transferred from the consumers to the producers. This will amount to more than \$1,250,000 annually. The new capital stock tax enacted by the Congress will

cost the Electric Department another \$200,000 a year.

Electric Position Changed By \$4,000,000 Downward

Thus it is seen that the Electric Department's position has been changed downward since the first of January by more than \$4,000,000 on an annual basis. The Electric and Gas Company has signed the President's Re-employment Agreement as modified by the substituted provisions of the odes submitted for the Electric Light and Power and Gas industries. This will further substantially increase the operating expenses of the Electric and Gas Company and paricularly with reference to the Electric Department.

There are many reasons why it would be impracticaleconomically impractical—to embark upon an electric rate reduction proceeding at this time. Assuming that it were started, what would be the base upon which—the base of commodity prices upon which—the valuation should be made? Would it be the prices prevailing in the decade between 1920 and 1930, or the average of them? be the prices of today? Or would it be the prices of the infla-

Would it be the prices of 1932? Would it be the very greatly depressed prices of the first part of 1933? Would it tion, if it takes place, as the result of the activities of the The whole subject of commodity prices is in a state of flux, in a condition where it is absolutely impractical to find a reasonable or fair basis of valuation in any proceeding of

this character. The prices of today may not be-are very likely not to be-the prices of tomorrow. Furthermore, should a rate schedule be based on the schedule of 15 per cent. reduction in wages such as prevails in the Electric and Gas Company today, as well as in all the other departments of Public Service? Are wages thus reduced to be in part the basis of operating expenses upon which rates are to be determined, prohibiting at any time recognition of the justice of a return to a higher scale—the scale that was considered fair before the present economic condition arose?

Contradictory to the Recovery Program

One of the chief reasons why rate reductions should not be enforced today is that such a procedure would be contradictory to the national recovery program which the President of the United States has authorized. This program's object is to end unemployment, reduce the hours of labor and to raise wages. The President's program aims to increase prices,

The foregoing facts apply wholly to the electric end of Public Service activities and indicate why a rate reduction procedure should not be undertaken at this time. If it were a undoubtedly show, in connection with the Electric Department alone and without complicating circumstances, that the existing electric rates are just and reasonable.

But in any rate proceeding there would necessarily be injected into the problem the local transportation equation. Under the complicated troubles that have arisen not only in this locality but throughout the country generally, local transportation is a national industry in distress. It is absolutely essential that this industry be continued here and elsewhere to render a service that the public requires. But no industry can continue that is not provided a return sufficient to keep it

Public Service Coordinated Transport responded a fewyears ago to the wish of the State Board of Public Utility Commissioners and continued the five cent fare. It was possible to accede to the wishes of the Board because, with all Public Service revenues from all sources pooled together, the return on the whole, while not fully satisfactory, was better than continual rate agitation of the transport problem, -

How Transport Fares Would Affect Situation

If Public Service Coordinated Transport filed an application for a ten cent fare, it could not, under the circur-stances, be resisted. Assuming that a reduction were allowed in electric rates, even as high as ten per cent., and that a ten cent fare were set for street cars and buses, it then becomes obvious to all that the saving in the monthly electric bill would be more than counterbalanced by the increased cost of transportation. Public Service Coordinated Transport, however, would prefer to continue the five cent fare as long as it

Notwithstanding the constantly increasing taxes imposed upon Public Service companies, the bill having risen from \$8,280,000 in 1922 to almost \$18,000,000 in 1932, the electric rates have been reduced seven times since 1922.

Four of the reductions were made during a period of inflation when the prices of most other commodities were abnormally high. Three of the reductions were made since the peak year of 1929, notwithstanding the depression,

volves an initial expenditure of several millions of dollars for new dies, which renders a change very costly. Cars, especially large expensive cars which are produced in small volume, cannot afford this, because the dies cost as much for one car as for a million. That alone explains why ail-

In the Ford body there are no joints to squeak, no seams to-crack The all-steel body is more expensive—to us, but not to you.

By all odds, then, steel bodies seem preferable. Wheels also have become all-steel. No one argues that an electrically welded one-piece steel wheel, such as the Ford wheel, needs to be "strengthened" by adding wood to it. The one-piece all-steel body is the strongest, safest, quietest, most durable body made. That is our only reason for making them.
