W. is launching a new movement for immediate cash payment of World War veterans' service certificates. We are approaching the season of warm and longer burning. Start during which forest fires are an imminent hazard to the camper. It is said that the campers are responsible for fires that destroy valuable timber, ruin game cover, and burn out camps. The proper care will minimize fire hazards in the woods and it is up to those who camp to take that care.

First: make sure all brush and inflammable material is cleared away from the fireplace.

Second: Build a stove fireplace, if possible. (This is a simple procedure and only takes a few minutes.)

Third: keep the fire down to a small blaze and avoid poking at it too much and stirring up sparks that fly with the wind.

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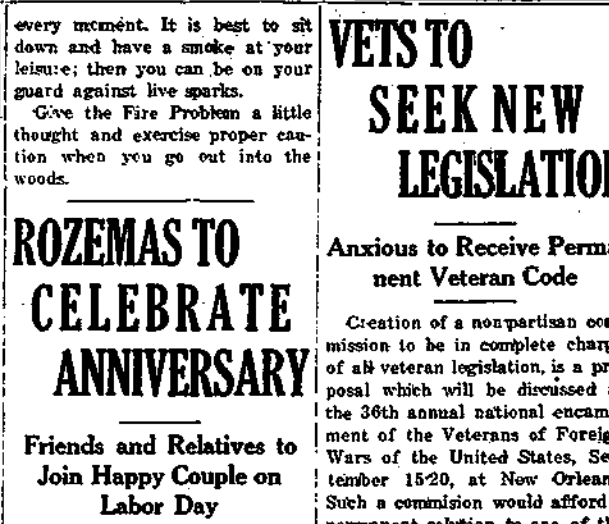

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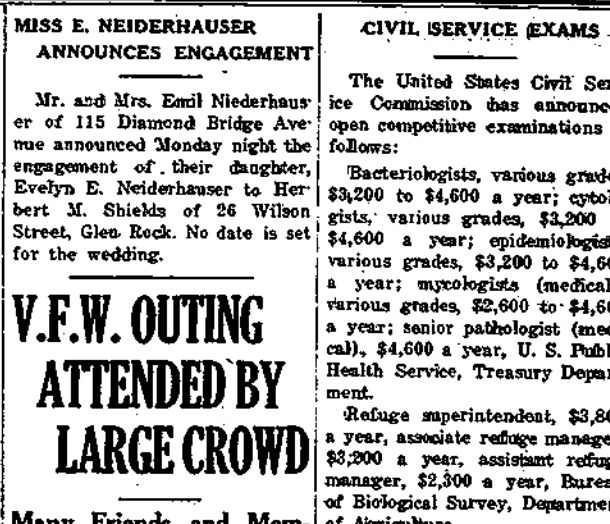
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VETS TO SEEK NEW LEGISLATION
