

Know Your Government

Several weeks ago when the New Jersey Taxpayers Association announced that last year's taxes were reduced this year in fifty-nine per cent of the municipalities of this state, the news was generally accepted as indicating a trend favorable to taxpayers.

Although this is true it would be a glaring mistake to overlook the large number of municipalities which did not fare so fortunately. Of New Jersey's 865 municipalities, 209, or 27 percent, increased their rates while 23, or 4 percent, remained the same. Even though there are in the minority a fertile field still remains for the reduction of municipal spending.

While in the state as a whole the majority of municipalities enjoyed reduction, the reverse is the case in five counties. In Atlantic, Burlington, Essex, Passaic, and Somerset counties, the majority of local governments increased the tax rates.

Most serious aspect of the situation is that rates increased in several of the largest cities. Among the eight largest municipalities in respect to net valuation taxable (those with more than \$100,000,000 in net valuation taxable property) the rates were increased in four of them. The largest increase was in Newark, where the rate was increased 100 percent.

It is regrettable, in view of the progressive work throughout the state, particularly in a large number of suburbs and rural communities, that the record of the state as a whole has been largely offset by increases in so many of the larger cities.

Knowledge of the work points in this year's tax record is a valuable guide for action next year. Organized taxpayers are now preparing for a campaign over a broad front to retain and improve rates made this year and the same time to correct wherever possible the unfavorable aspects of 1941.
