tion. "That this world, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom, a paraphrase of Lincoln's words at Gettysburg. The Freedom Bell will be dedicated later this fall in Berlin—behind the Iron Curtain at the airport where General Clay's big lift made history by thwarting the Soviet blockade. Copies of the Declaration of Freedom signed by New Jersey citizens will be exhibited under the bell, along with others bearing names of millions of Americans from other states.

"The Freedom Bell will stand as a permanent symbol of the free world's determination to triumph over totalitarian tyranny and oppression," Mr. Shanley declared. "By enrolling in the Freedom Crusade, New Jersey citizens will be discharging a measure of their personal responsibility for leadership in the world today.

"The Declaration of Freedom will bring a message of sympathy and encouragement to millions of oppressed people under the heel of Communism not only in Europe, but in other parts of the world."

To further that end, Mr. Shanley explained, ceremonies at Templehof will be broadcast throughout the world. Simultaneously with the first peal of the Freedom Bell from Berlin, school and church bells will be rung throughout free countries. World-famous church and civic leaders will take part in the program.

While the primary purpose of the Crusade is to demonstrate that the American people are morally behind the cause of liberty, the program is also aimed at winning support for Radio Free Europe, a new broadcasting station in Western Germany, Mr. Shanley said.

The station, erected and operated by a group of public-spirited American citizens, picks up where the Voice of America is forced to leave off by restrictions of governmental and international protocol, Mr. Shanley explained. Unhindered by the rules of international relations, Radio Free Europe brings the story of free men and hope to Communist-dominated people of Eastern Europe "with no holds barred," he said.

other similar training courses all over the United States. These first men trained were chosen from many walks of life, but they were selected from the most capable lay leaders of the whole Church, who have accepted the call to this kind of service as a signal honor.

When the training courses have been given to 2,300 laymen, the approach directly to the people of the Church will be made, and it is anticipated that the parish meetings will bring practically the entire membership of the Church to hear of the plans for the year 1951.

Episcopal Church headquarters in New York stated that never in the history of the Church has there been such a large-scale use made of laymen in active, practical promotion of the objectives of the Church. The need, in today's crisis, for a Christian nation in a Christian world, "Only Christianity can bring peace to the world," said the statement. "It is the only true safeguard against the menace of militant atheistic communism."

These were manufacturing, public utilities other than interstate railroads, and some undistributed establishments. Among manufacturing industries showing increased hirings from SES sources are: apparel and related products; 1951 electrical machinery; 453; miscellaneous manufacturing; 343; machinery, except electric; 223; chemicals and allied; 223; transportation equipment; 223; leather and leather products; 153; furniture and fixtures; 194; products of petroleum and coal; 194; rubber products; 453; and tobacco manufacturing; 453.

Constant hiring increases according to major occupational groups were service workers, 549 and unskilled workers 2156. Semi-skilled workers dropped from 2219 in June to 1929 in July.
