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Cancer Deaths Have Increased In Passaic County

Statistics compiled by the American Cancer Society, New Jersey Division, from the records of the New Jersey State Department of Health reveal that in a six-year period the number of cancer deaths in Passaic County has increased. In 1946 there were 514 cancer deaths and in 1951 579 deaths, a difference of 65.

For a number of years more women died of cancer than men but for the past two years the trend in many counties has been reversed. In New Jersey in 1951 a total of 8548 residents died of the disease, exclusive of 299 who died in state institutions. Of these 4575 were men and 4073 women. In Passaic County, a total of 346 men and 324 women died. This is compared to 341 men and 304 women who died in 1946 and 254 men and 234 women passed away in 1946.

In most of the counties the number of deaths of 70 and over had the greatest number of deaths with 240 70-79 year olds. In Passaic County in 1951 there were 224 deaths in the 70 year and over bracket; 188 in the 60-69; 145 in the 50-59; 88 in the 40-49; 30 in the 30-39; 25 in the 20-29 and deaths among those under 20 years of age.

Cancer deaths in the large communities of Passaic County have increased. In 1946 there were 1551 deaths from cancer in the county. In 1951 there were 1683 deaths from cancer in the county. In 1951 the rate of cancer deaths in the county was 16.8 per 100,000 population. In 1946 the rate was 15.5 per 100,000 population.

Compulsory Health Insurance Is Sick!

At its creation, the Republican Party was solidly on record against socialized medicine or any variant thereof, with a plank which said, in part, "We are opposed to Federal Compulsory Health Insurance with its crushing cost, wasteful inefficiency, bureaucratic dead weight and debased standard of medical care."

The health plank adopted by the Democratic Party is on the vague side. It advocates Federal aid to medical education. But it does not endorse the compulsory health insurance plan. This in itself marks a significant change, for formerly, due to Administration pressure, the Party has urged that plan as the proper solution to our health problems.

These planks—the one very positive, the other somewhat of a compromise—unquestionably reflect the fact that that policy-makers in both parties have come to the conclusion that the American people want no part of either socialized medicine or politically-dominated medicine. Every poll and survey has indicated that, and it is an interesting sidelight on the situation that the recent Congresses haven't even bothered to bring the health insurance scheme to a vote.

This doesn't mean that the public at large or Congress thinks that we have no health problems, and that nothing needs to be done. Everybody concerned—including the doctors—recognizes these problems and is vitally interested in their ultimate solution. But the great majority want them to be solved without compulsory political tax measures of the type which have obviously reduced the standards of medical care in other nations. Very great progress has been made in a short period of time to better serve our health needs. Far greater progress will come in the future on a voluntary basis.

OPS Retrenches

The Office of Price Stabilization must soon cut its staff in half—from 12,000 to about 6,000 employees—because of heavy budget reductions imposed by Congress.

As is to be expected, OPS and other officials are saying that the result will be to cripple the whole price control program, and that the consumer will be the greatest sufferer. That may seem a compelling argument to many people. But it is purely a superficial argument which ignores the long-term damage the controls create and the damage they do to the economy.

Controls, by their very nature, attempt to replace the natural law of supply and demand with fallible human judgment. Political expediency—the everlasting search for votes and patronage and power—often influences that judgment. Business is smothered in red tape, and harried with volumes of complex, confused and conflicting rules and regulations. Everyone from the biggest manufacturer down to the corner retail store is harassed by bureaucrats and jobholders who frequently have small understanding of the matters with which they deal.

Under these conditions, initiative is lost, ambition is dimmed, lethargy sets in. If the controls are of the "tough" variety which short-sighted people have demanded, the inevitable result is a drop in the production and distribution of goods of many kinds—people won't spend their time and money and energies trying to do a job if they see no chance to make a fair profit.

Congress did a wise thing when it heavily cut OPS appropriations. It would have done a much wiser thing had it abolished the bureau entirely and given us back the free economy which is responsible for the unequalled living standards of our people.

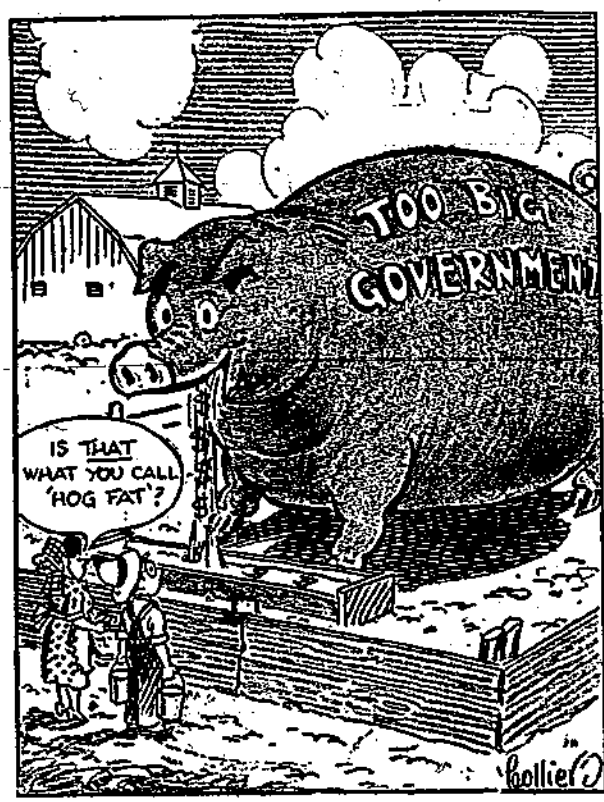
No Seventh Heaven

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
