Thrift's Birthday

This is an anniversary day which is the birthday of the nation's thrift. It is the day when Americans in every conceivable occupation, in every economic and social level, are called upon to observe the largest thrift program of all time.

Fifteen years ago, in 1941, the United States Treasury Department initiated a program to raise money for national defense and as a brake against inflation by borrowing from as many persons as possible. This was the birth of the series E Bonds. It was the birth also of what was to become the largest thrift program of all time.

Treasury officials are human, rumor to the contrary notwithstanding, and none among them could have foreseen, or even dreamed of, the incredible growth of the series E Bonds idea until today it has become an integral part of the American way of life.

According to Treasury Secretary George M. Humphrey more than 40 million Americans today own more than \$40 billion in series E and H Bonds, the latter being added to the thrift program in 1942. And of these bond owners more than 8 million are saving more than \$100 million a month through the payroll savings plan by means of the patriotic cooperation of the huge corporations or the small businesses where they work, and of organized labor as a friendly and persuasive associate.

It was to be expected in the fervor of the World War II years that a great many Americans would buy Savings Bonds, and a great many more. But when the war was over, and the "terror" gone, they kept buying them—what is the astonishing thing, and that is why the accompanying communique these millions of Americans are celebrating this year.

The Record Speaks

Germany—a country which was ravaged by war, suffered total defeat, and has since been a bedeviled sector of the world—can teach the United States some lessons as to the value of free enterprise.

Germany's postwar economic recovery is almost universally acknowledged as a miracle. This miracle, as William Henry Chamberlain explains in his book "The German Economy," is the result of a dynamic combination of factors: "the dynamic character of the German people, their 'hunger' for 'on the one hand' and 'on the other hand'." He adds: "The men who directed economic policy... believed passionately in free enterprise, competition, free international trade and investment."

By contrast, those European nations—including various nations—which deserted these principles in favor of some form of paternalistic state have suffered one economic crisis after another, coupled with all manner of political crises.

The record speaks for itself.

WHEN DOWN IS UP
How much did Congress "cut" foreign aid appropriations this year?
This should make a good question for quiz contestants because the popular impression created by discussions in Congress this year is that a substantial cut was effected. Actually, the three and three-quarter billion dollar appropriation for foreign aid approved by the Congress is approximately a billion dollars more than was voted last year. Explanation: The mutual security appropriations bill for fiscal 1957 as finally enacted totals \$3.8 billion. While this is approximately one billion less than the \$4.8 billion requested in budget estimates, it is \$1.1 billion more than corresponding appropriations voted by Congress for fiscal 1956 which ended June 30, 1956.
