CIVIL DEFENSE HEAD ALEX KOMAR LISTS PRECAUTIONS STORM

Alex Komar, Passaic County Coordinator of Civil Defense and Disaster Control, has received from the State Division of Civil Defense and Disaster Control a list of precautions to be taken before, during and after tropical storms. With Hurricane Anna whipping up, and memories of last year's Hurricane Donna still fresh in most minds, Coordinator Komar urges all citizens to acquaint themselves with the following "do's and don'ts" because it is his firm belief that by so doing, it will prevent or minimize loss of property or life.

Pre-Hurricane Measures:
Check your home. Secure loose shutters and shutters. Repair shaky chimneys.

Check your yard. Trim or remove dead or dying trees. Anchor objects such as dog houses and lumber piles.

Have a battery-powered radio available. Power lines are usually among the first victims of a storm.

Have at least one flashlight available.

When a Hurricane is Expected To Strike Your Area:

Listen to your radio or television for the Weather Bureau's latest reports and warnings. Keep your radio and television on.

Get away from low-lying beaches and other areas which may be swept by storm tides or waves. If you are in a high ground is likely to be under water, leave early. Don't risk being marooned.

Differences between extreme low pressure in a hurricane and high pressure inside a building often causes large picture and show windows to be blown out. Blowing tape cemented on these windows should prevent this.

Stay indoors during the storm. (Continued On Page 5)

RICH UNCLE?

Like a suddenly discovered rich uncle who never realized he had so many relatives, Uncle Sam is finding some far-flung claimants for Federal aid granted school districts located in so-called "Federal-impoverished" areas.

This is the program set up by the Congress several years ago to extend Federal funds to local school districts where enrollment and costs are burdened by a local concentration of children of families drawn to Federal military or defense operations. A report of the Federal General Accounting Office has brought to light some extreme claims upon funds for these "Federal-impoverished" school districts.

"GAO" was critical of failure of the U. S. Office of Education to adequately "qualify" schools for aid. Under which school districts might claim Federal aid for "Federal-impoverished" school districts, the report observed. Some districts, this revealed,

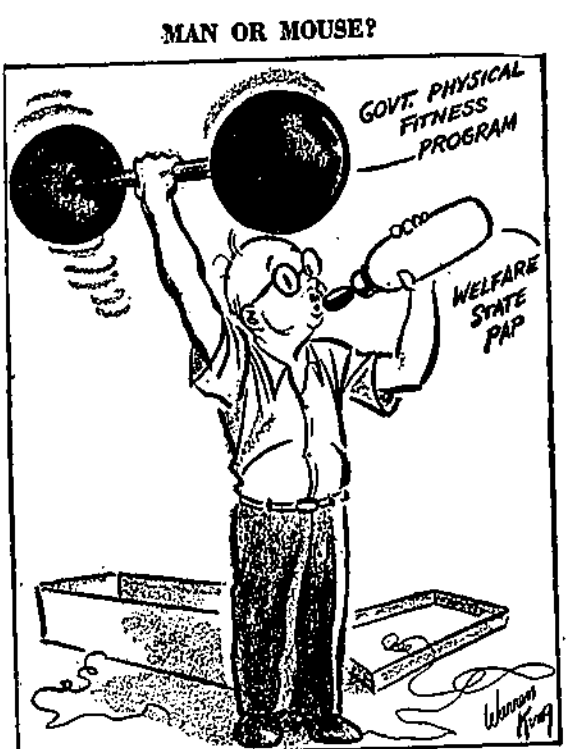

Hearth and History



The Pilgrim Fathers landed on Plymouth Rock and found an empty land of virgin land—all owned by the English king. Settlers depended on the favor of royal grants for the land they cleared.

A word is needed here about our long-existing policy toward the national parks, which total, with monuments and other recreation areas, some 22 million acres. These are administered under a multiple-use concept which means, as Mr. Bird explains it, that "each forest or land area is managed to combine uses which are suitable to that particular land and to the public interest." For example, national forest lands may—under very strict controls—be opened to grazing, mineral development, and utilization of water for farms and industries. Opponents of the present proposal wilderness bill argue that it would violate the multiple-use principle. They also point out that, because of this principle, the parks bring in more than \$100 million a year to the Treasury.

Commercial exploitation of an area, properly conducted, need not be destructive. Mr. Bird cites the example of the moose on the Kenai Peninsula in Alaska. Twenty years ago 2 million acres were set aside for their range. Later it was found that major oil deposits lay within it. A group of U. S. oil companies sought permission to drill. Despite protests that this would scare the moose away, permission was finally given, with the companies promising to take every care to protect the moose and their range. As it turned out, the moose weren't bothered at all; the geologists were. The animals have proved resilient by curious, and most of the herd hangs out where drilling is under way.

Numbers of authorities say that over-caution in protecting nature is the best policy. Mr. Bird also touches on the conservation practices followed in the Pacific Northwest by leading timber companies, such as Weyerhaeuser and Clearing. They look for the future—the old "cut-out-and-leave-it" days are over. On one side, the companies promise to take every care to protect the moose and their range. As it turned out, the moose weren't bothered at all; the geologists were. The animals have proved resilient by curious, and most of the herd hangs out where drilling is under way.

At any rate, the debate goes on. It has some surprising facets. Mr. Bird writes in conclusion: "The next fight, some observers believe, will be between various breeds of outdoor addicts. On one side will be the rising swarm of environmentalists and conservationists who want to penetrate the back country, not on foot, but by jeep, mountain-bike, motor, light plane or helicopter, and who want to take along chains saws to cut their road, and outdoor motor to push their campers. And on the other side will be the strict preservationists who want to enjoy our beautiful wilderness sanctuaries in nature's own quiet. At this point, it's hard to say just which side will win."

However, after the night crawler has been introduced to come up out of its hole, most anglers employ the grab-bag method—and miss a lot of worms. Here's a better way: Build yourself the simple worm catching device. On the end of an old broom handle attach a piece of wood one-half inch thick, one inch wide and three inches long. Tie this stick a piece of coarse sand paper. When you spot your worm, pin him to the ground. The sand paper will hold him without damaging him.

HUNTING

Here's a tip for dove hunters who need more doves to shoot at. When you spot a dove in a field go hide yourself in the nearest woods or other cover. Then, give a few blasts on your crow call. This will speak the doves and they will make for nearby cover—nearly you. If, for some reason, this does not work out, there's always the chance you'll get some crow shooting.

One problem that belongs to duck hunters is the transportation of all that duck-hunting gear to and from the marshes, ponds and so on. The answer is as simple as it is ancient. Instead of lugging around one big sack of decoys, put the decoys in two smaller bags. Tie the bags together and swing over your shoulder. They will balance out and leave both your hands free to

as to be no good at all. To start a fire without matches, wet a strip of cloth with gasoline. Remove one of the spark plug wires from your outboard. Hold the cloth between the wire and the plug and turn over the engine. You'll have fire plenty quick. Needless to say this method is for emergencies only and strands of business should proceed with caution.

HOUSING FOR FISH

Rincon Island grows palm trees and on oil derrick. Now it's growing fish. Yet only a few years ago there were no palms, no derrick, no fish. There wasn't even an island. Site of this unusual industrial enterprise—this newly added bit of offshore America built of rock and concrete—is off the southern California coast near Rincon Point, midway between Santa Barbara and Ventura.

The story of its development involves biologists and geologists, barges and junkyards, bulldozers and budgets. And the story is by no means yet complete. The most recent chapter might be entitled "Apartment House for Fish."

Several months ago an oil can many bays piled the waters off coast near Rincon Point, midway between Santa Barbara and Ventura.

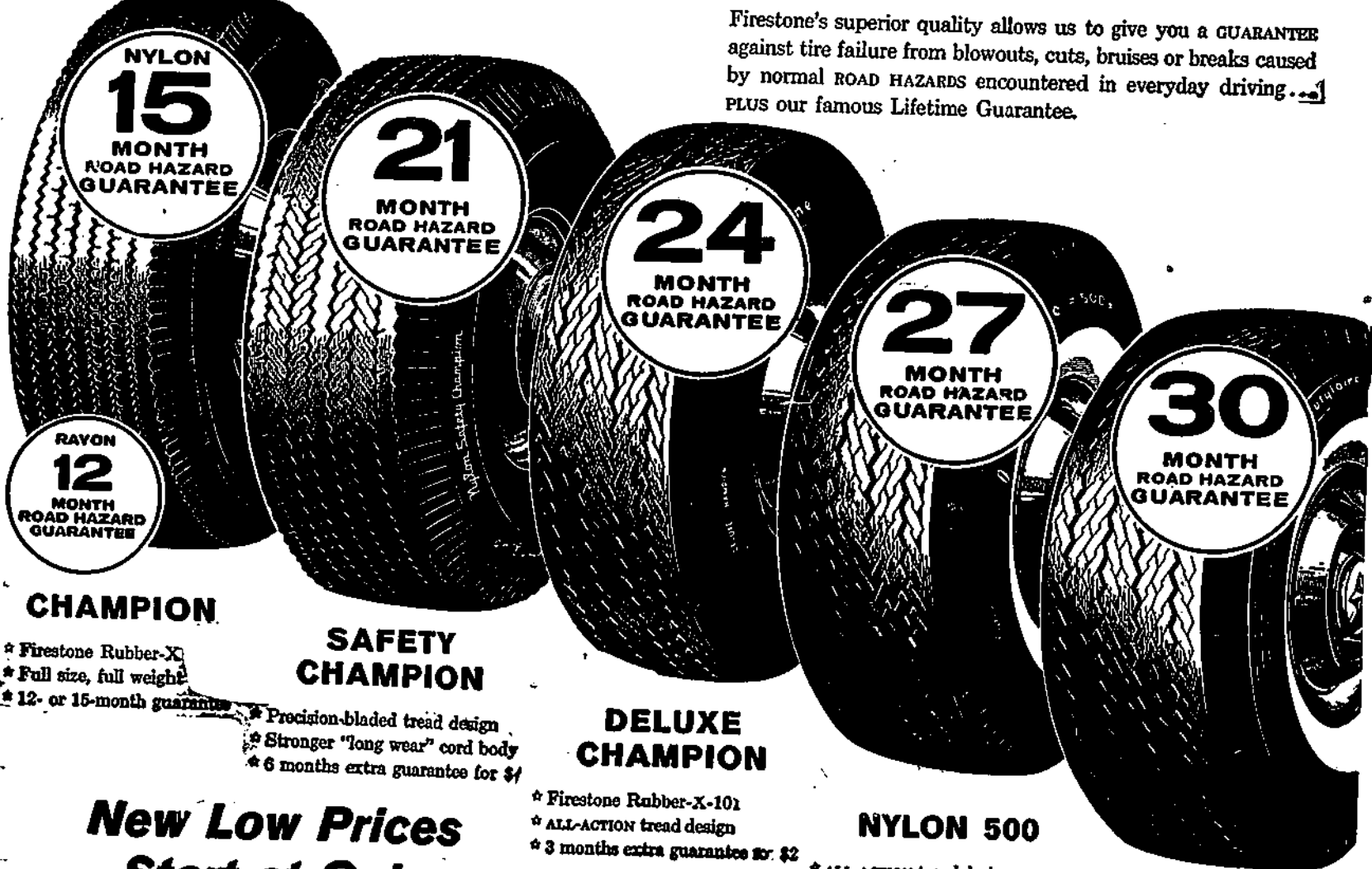

Even when I started to practice, within the last 20-odd years, you'd probably have been dead in 24 hours. We didn't have the weapons to fight with."

In short, Cal-Tax found a way to combat a universal weakness in the conduct of civic affairs—that those favoring high, wide and handsome spending while at the same time getting up the money at home until it's too late to bail. So effective, in fact, have the methods proved that the Cal-Tax pattern of organization and operation has been adopted in 37 other states and at least two dozen former Cal-Tax areas have formed similar citizens' state budget experts and administrators. Two have even gone into the U.S. Bureau of the Interior—and we can hope they will be there!

"People figures" said one of these vigilantes, "that after four years of vigilance, the state of California spends billions of dollars less, some of that money ought to be spent on them. They forget they themselves have to pay the bills." But Cal-Tax is reminding them in the most impressive way we have yet heard of.

There is a story that should be read aloud in the meetings of every taxpayers group in America. While 250,000 West Berliners are in the state and prison, the state of California is spending \$100,000,000 on the Four Power agreement in settling off East Berlin. Mayor Willy Brandt told them he said that his people expected "not merely words but political action."

And in Bonn, Bully-boy Khrushchev sent his ambassador over to Chancellor Adenauer with the word that he had no plans in mind to stir things up further in Berlin. Mr. Adenauer replied that he didn't want conditions to get any worse, either.

A Bear In The Air

Soviet and American delegations are meeting to discuss a commercial air treaty between the two countries. Two airlines are involved—Pan American World Airways and Aeroflot, the Soviet state airline.

Both of these enterprises fly modern aircraft—and that where any similarity ends. Pan American, which pioneered international air service and more recently inaugurated jet service under the flag, is a free enterprise corporation, owned by 40,000 stockholders, which must pay its own way and try to make some kind of a profit. Aeroflot is a department of the Soviet government, and a part of the Red Air Force. It is not concerned with operating costs, much less profit. Whatever funds are needed to keep it going are doled out by the Soviet government.

Throughout its history Pan American has competed with subsidized, low-wage, foreign flag carriers which have, in one way or another, received strong financial support from their governments, and have, in one degree or another, been intimately identified with their governments as instruments of national interest. The fact that Pan Am has been able to do this says much for its efficiency and spirit. But the Russians pose a new and greater threat in the form of a competitor to whom cost is no object. The American delegates to the negotiations will have to proceed with the utmost care if vital American interests are to be protected. The Russian Bear, in his furthest of economic war against the West, always tries to follow a no-holds-barred policy.

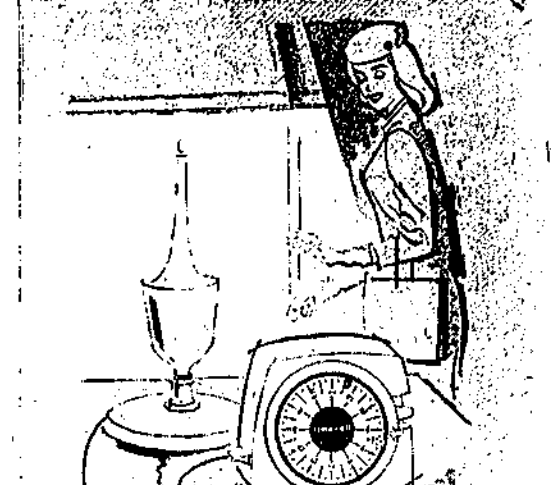
