What Is Welfare?

Throughout the years since the very beginning of the exploration of the New World, this has been the land of opportunity. Early history is filled with early explorers' tales of streets paved with gold and the wealth that would reward any daring adventurer willing to migrate to the virgin land.

Over the decades since, millions of people have followed the ocean paths in search of the fulfillment of the promised dream. Some have made it, more in fact than ever before in the history of man. Others have not.

The American is, despite many shortcomings, a generous individual. He has learned that he has an unwritten obligation to his neighbor to help when needed. If another man is unable to care for himself why shouldn't he share in the abundance? If a man is unable temporarily to provide for his family's needs others will help him with the necessities until he is able to return to the work force. This is as it should be. We are a capitalist society. Each of us profits by the labor of others. What one produces for another consumer. What is consumed is paid for with earnings received for productivity. The more men employed, the larger the market. Aid to the incapacitated is welfare. It is not demeaning. It is our way of proving to the world that we take care of our own. Aid to the temporarily unemployed is welfare. It, too, is not of itself degrading but a way of showing confidence in our system. It is an investment in the recipient's future, and should provide enough to prevent hunger or misery, without encouraging permanent unemployment.

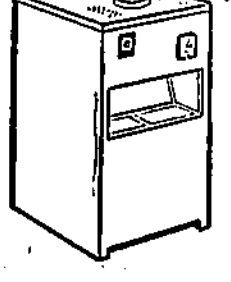
When welfare provides a means of remaining unemployed, the time has come for Americans to have a careful look at exactly how much welfare can be dispensed without threatening their future.

In the years of actual production between 1939 and 1945, 5,222 units were made — 3,045 Continental coupes and 2,277 chaffinix convertibles. They soon became collector's items. Set on a 125-inch wheelbase, the Lincoln Continental was three inches lower and seven inches longer than most of its standard contemporaries, and its V-12 engine was polished like a jewel. The V-shape grille on the 1940-41 models was identical to that of the Zephyr. The 1941 Continental, with parking lights set under the front fenders and flush-type door latch handles instead of the standard exterior door handles, was slightly different from its 1940 predecessor. It was the only Lincoln to have a "continental" chassis. The Lincoln Continental was one contemporary publication said of the 1941 model: "Every line of this new car, every move it makes, tells of far places, and ease of reaching them. The Lincoln-Continental is true to a great heritage. It blends Lincoln precision and care with Lincoln Zephyr leadership in design."

The sensational Model "A" made its appearance in 1927. It was a completely new car from the radiator cap to the rear axle. It sold for only \$495 and ran up to 30 miles on a gallon of gas. The new Ford could attain speeds of 60 to 70 miles per hour.

Ford, in bringing out the Model "A," got away from its traditional and long lived Model "T." Hasty and glamorized its new product to compete with the style and performance of the other manufacturers of the era.

The much improved engine of the Model "A" sported 40 h.p., which for the day, was considered a high compression power plant.

So, as we can see today, the Ford Model "A" has long outlived many of the thousands of makes of autos that were built during the same production years and it appears that the sturdy "A" will outlast some of today's flashy models.

CLUB HISTORY

In February of 1961, a small group of young men, interested in automobiles, met to form an auto club. At first the Club had to meet in various members' homes until they received their first lucky break. The Club was housed in a garage by the first president's father, Mr. Alex Shovon. March, 1961, the Road Rebels Auto Club of Hawthorne was formed. The name of the Club was not accepted by many of the town's citizens. Thereafter the organization had very little recognition in the town. To gain the needed acceptance, the members purchased plaques and passed out courtesy cards to motorists that they avoided on the road, but to little avail.

With the start of 1962, Harry Richardson was elected president, and the campaign for advancement went on. Courtesy cards were constantly being passed out, and letters of thanks were received by the Hawthorne Police Department, from the aided motorists. In the course of the year, the Club participated in many fund raising campaigns; the Cancer Drive, the Mother's March of Dimes, the Heart Fund, and they raised money for a local needy family.

In the spring of 1962, the Club bought its first car, a 1933 Chevrolet. This started the Club's interest in antique cars. The Club also held a dance that year to raise money so they could continue to be an active part of the community. The dance was a financial setback and the morale of some of the members began to drop. At that time the Club was on the verge of collapse, but through hard work and a lot of spirit, the members managed to stay together.

Good luck struck in 1963, when Mr. C. Macfarlan of 452 Coffie Road authorized the use of a three-story, century old barn to the Club. Shortly after that, the structure was refinished and modernized to the present state. For the rest of 1963, the Club continued its fund raising campaigns and passed out more courtesy cards with more letters of recommendation being sent to the Police Department from grateful motorists. Another dance was held, this one an all around success. The membership grew as did the Club's knowledge of automobiles and by December, four cars were built and raced in competition at many of the sanctioned race tracks in the area.

1964 brought the Club full acceptance from the town of Hawthorne. At this time the Club sponsored its first Antique and Classic Auto Show with great success and satisfaction. Many of the town's noted people attended that show, some of these people were Congressman Charles Jacobsen, Mayor Ray of Hawthorne, Chief Charles Kenyon of Hawthorne, and our benefactress Mrs. C. Macfarlan.

1965 and 1966 found the Club expanding its work in the community and sponsored its second and third annual auto shows, both of which were great success. In 1967, the Road Rebels Auto Club, after being an unofficial organization for more than six years, filed corporation papers with the State of New Jersey. During this year the Club sponsored a fourth auto show, dedicating the exhibition to the retiring Chief of Police of Hawthorne, Chief Charles F. Kenyon.

Financial problems befall the outfit during 1968, and prevented the staging of another auto show. But this year finds the Road Rebels Auto Club engaged in the normal realm of engine-varying and rebuilding plus the planning of the Fifth Auto Show to be held in the town of Hawthorne.

After being together for more than eight and a half years, the members of the Road Rebels Auto Club, look toward the future in this a time of great and swift change.

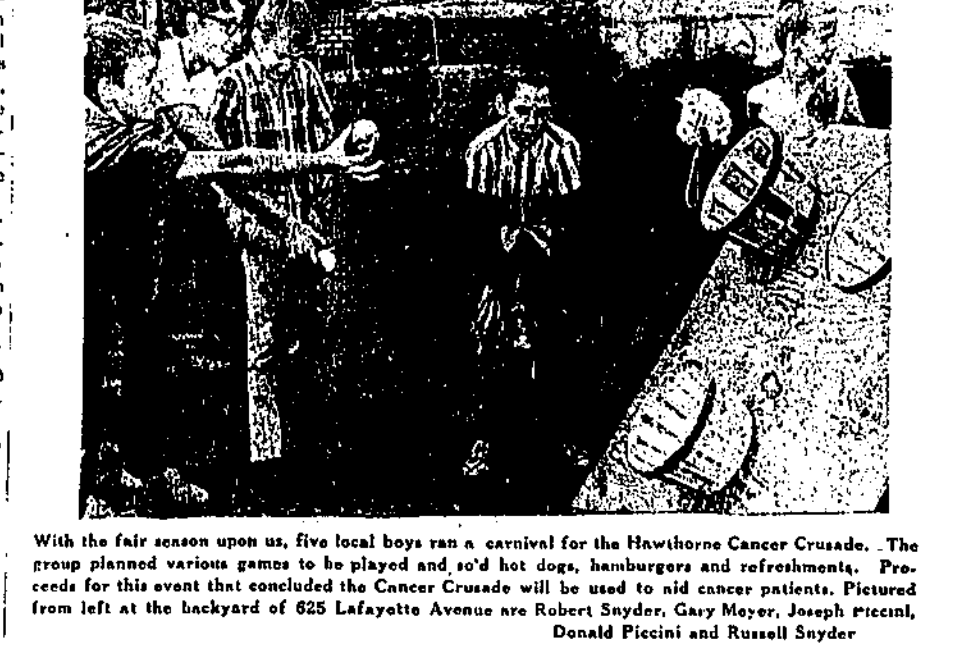

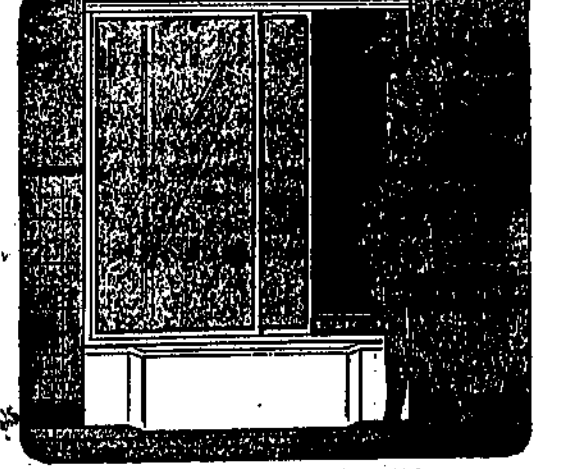
Nobody's Business
