A Different Approach

England is going all-out in an effort to make electric power production from atomic energy practical on a big commercial scale. And the reason for this—as Lord Cleeve, chairman of Great Britain's Central Electricity Authority, explained at a New York meeting sponsored by the National Industrial Conference Board—is England's acute coal shortage. Lord Cleeve said that the shortage is growing and there is no indication of future improvement. Therefore, he added significantly, England's approach to nuclear power must be different from that of the United States, which is blessed with coal resources.

Actually, we have more than this blessing. We have the world's most advanced and efficient coal industry, prepared to meet any demand with grades of coal "tailored" to fit the particular needs of various kinds of users. And coal is a very economical source of electricity—due to the vast advances in utilization resulting from research efforts by the coal industry, along with the electrical equipment and utility industries. This point was emphasized by another authority, an engineer for a leading electric company, who attended the New York meeting. He said that "for a great number of years fossil fuels will supply the great bulk of electric power in this country." He also observed that there is no basis for expecting radical changes in costs from nuclear power, even if all hopes for it eventually materialize, because the fuel cost in electric energy is so small that successful nuclear power could have only an insignificant impact on the total electric bill of domestic consumers.

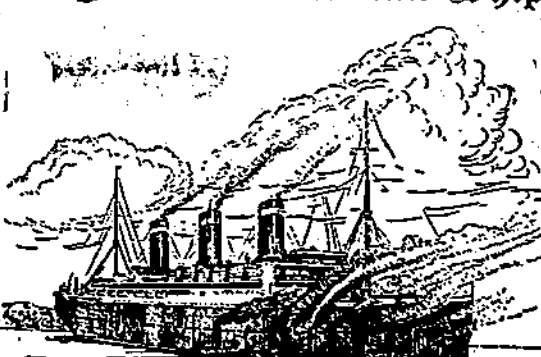

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Gains for Free Enterprise

Out of the long struggle over the Dixon-Yates contract—under which taxpayers private enterprise was to build a big plant to feed electric power into the TVA system—"have come a number of distinct gains in the interest of free enterprise." That statement was made by one of the principals—E. H. Dixon, president of Middle South Utilities, Inc. He added the struggle also produced "a better understanding on our part of the strength and the tactics of forces in this country which have been well described . . . as a privileged class for America . . . referring . . . to the tax-supported and government-subsidized power groups."

All sorts of wild and malicious charges were made against Dixon-Yates—each and every one of which was refuted by facts of record. The contract was an extremely favorable one for the government and, at best, the company's profit would have been modest. More important, the federal power groups didn't win. They wanted the TVA itself to undertake the development, and they were denied that. The contract was cancelled when Memphis officials said that the city would build its own municipal plant, thus making Dixon-Yates power unnecessary.

Finally, because of the Dixon-Yates fight, more people know more about socialized power, TVA-style. They know, for example, that TVA pays no federal taxes and relatively small sums in lieu of local taxes. They know that it represents an investment of \$1,600,000,000 of tax money, on which it has not paid a single cent of interest. They know that it is subsidized to the hilt. And that's the kind of knowledge this country needs.

Six months away from home, school, or work is all the Army asks of its 17 to 24 year old volunteers under provisions of the new Reserve Forces Act.

The remainder will be served away from home. The new act, which requires two (2) years of active duty and four (4) years of reserve duty.

(Continued From Page One) Philadelphia Region, who said it was part of a new policy laid down by the National Office and is a continuation of the policy adopted by the Philadelphia Region late in March 1955.

Hereafter, the personal attention of one agent has been required for each tax return. Under the "Do It Yourself" plan, an agent will be on hand to assist a group of taxpayers as they prepare their own returns. If the taxpayer should run into any difficulty, the agent or assistant will help the taxpayer over the hump, but will positively not prepare the return for the taxpayer. The only persons who will get complete assistance are those isolated cases where taxpayers are illiterate, are temporarily or permanently physically handicapped, or do not speak, understand or write English.

Many taxpayers are actually surprised as to how easy the preparation of a tax return really is. The changeover gives them knowledge and confidence in handling their tax problems.

District Director Mayer said he will provide the best possible tax information during the filing period by way of newspapers, radio and TV announcements.

He also said taxpayers could save themselves time and money by preparing their returns at home. This would save them the inconvenience of coming to the Internal Revenue Office. If they run into a problem at home, telephone service will be available. Further information on the days designated for "Do It Yourself" at the Internal Revenue Office will be announced at a later date.

ROLL-OVER COASTER ANNUITIES

If you haven't heard yet of "variable annuities," you undoubtedly will. These are the fruits of a scheme by which the Prudential Insurance Company would like to traffic in stocks on the protection of the reversed annuity of insurance.

Three bills sponsored by the company and presently before the New Jersey Legislature would enable Prudential to sell annuity policies backed up by common stocks rather than by bonds and other investments subject to fluctuations in value.

Instead of the fixed monthly payments from retirement to death, holders of the prospective stock-based policies would receive the new and added thrill of riding the market roller-coaster, receiving more or less monthly income, depending on the stock market. And if Prudential can build the Jersey policy into legalizing the scheme, there would be a precedent for demanding similar benefits from the other 47 states.

Actually, as stated in a recent issue of The Journal of the American Society of Chartered Life Underwriters, application of "variable" to the word "annuity" is improper. And the reason, the Journal maintains, is that to use the word in this context would tend to confuse and mislead the public, because over a long period of time the word "annuity" has been used and understood to be a series of guaranteed periodic payments, fixed in amount, to continue for a life or for some other specified period.

Opposition from any company in the life insurance industry is vehement. Frederick W. Ecker, President of Metropolitan Life, for instance, says he's sure his company would do its best to buy stocks smartly, but we'd not be able to pick the bottoms and the tops of the market. There would be bound to be wide swings. And... some people would be hurt. I don't want that.

In fact, Mr. Ecker seems to have expressed the feeling of all segments of the insurance industry (except Prudential) when he said, "I don't want to be accused of letting the market roller-coaster, receiving more or less monthly income, depending on the stock market. And if Prudential can build the Jersey policy into legalizing the scheme, there would be a precedent for demanding similar benefits from the other 47 states."

For the protection of the public, there are Federal laws governing the issuance and sale of insurance company contracts. The American Society of Chartered Life Underwriters is a professional organization of life insurance company executives, and it is a member of the American Insurance Association, which is a national insurance trade organization. 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They play under the same rules for the protection of the public as others in those fields. But we think the Jersey lawmakers are likely to agree that in the grave responsibility of administering life insurance there should be a few "variables" as possible.

Nowadays, what with thousands of eager sales managers and salesmen advertising themselves as "little women" in the life insurance industry is the diversion of millions and the marvel of an age of mass.

And, as we are by the content promoters, we have just heard of a new one that is for the history book. At least, until two years of a sixty-four million dollar contest, it will do.

But you, dear reader, can not enter this one—unless you happen to be a hotel manager, hotel restaurant manager, restaurant owner or executive. What makes it interesting, however, is not the contest but the winners... who will be the housewives of America, from ocean to ocean and from border to border!

Purpose of the contest, which is being conducted by the International Silver Company under the auspices of the National Woman's Association, is to produce a slogan which the sponsor hopes will do for the public good what "Say It With Flowers" has done for the florists.

Once the shiny new slogan with all this commotion is discovered, it will be seized upon by the nation's biggest food firms and restaurant suppliers to headline a unified national advertising campaign which will see to it that Poppa takes Momma out to dinner often!

Then, while the author of the prize slogan will receive a thousand dollars (he must bring his own wheelbarrow), and 25 percent of the prize money will be shared by the winner's wife and children, the ultimate prize will be the wives and mothers who will gain more frequent parades from cook-stove and the dishpan.

Father, of course, will take it in stride—and like it too—because he is lugged out of his slippers.

Under our price support program, American agriculture looks more and more like a lady trying to squeeze into a giraffe two sizes too small.
