

#### A Law Against Vulturism

Although not grammatically correct, we are all familiar with the phrase "There oughta be a law." And we heard it often during the November "elections." As you may recall, the "peace" marches in Washington, D. C., as well as in some other cities, carried placards bearing the names of men who have given their lives for freedom in South Vietnam.

Many wives, parents and close relatives of these war heroes sought injunctions to prevent the unauthorized use of their loved one's names. These next-of-kin protested that their men would not have supported the so-called "peace" marches, hippies, yuppies, and collaborators in life, and therefore their names were being used against what their wishes would have been. We agree. There is no way to justify this sort of act. The best way to describe it might be to call it vulturism.

In Philadelphia the judge responded to the next-of-kin request, and granted the ban. But another judge in the Nation's Capital did not.

We are unable to explain, or to even guess, by what guideline the District of Columbia judge allowed the unauthorized use of these soldiers' names, but we do believe that for the future protection of the rights to privacy of the families, as well as the rights of the dead, there ought to be a law that will end such practice for all time without the slightest legal loophole. Such a piece of legislation has been introduced by Rep. Albert Watson (R-S.C.). The proposed law would ban the exploitation of the names of war dead without the express consent of the next-of-kin. This, it appears to us, makes sense.

We hope that those of our readers who believe as we do will write to their congressmen and U. S. Senators and urge that this bill be enacted before the names of our war dead are once more used in these displays of extremely poor taste.

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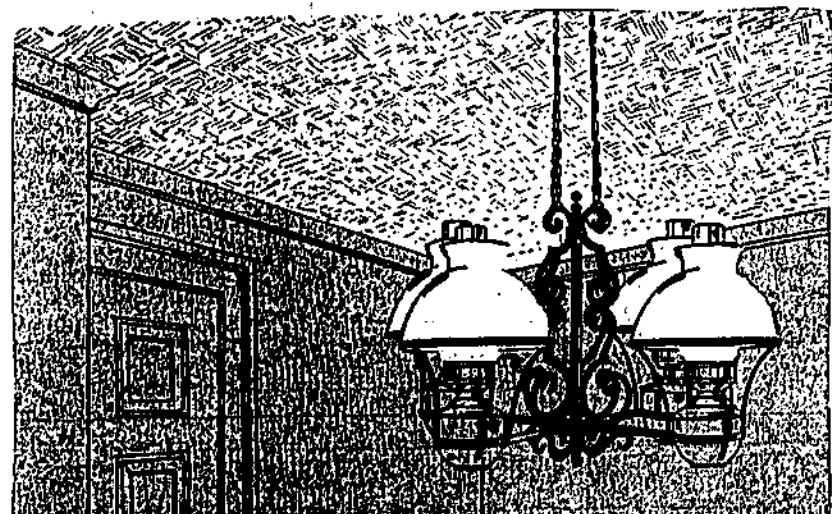

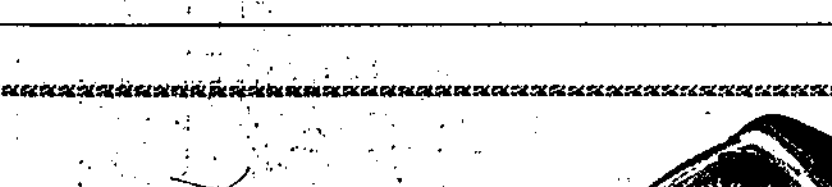

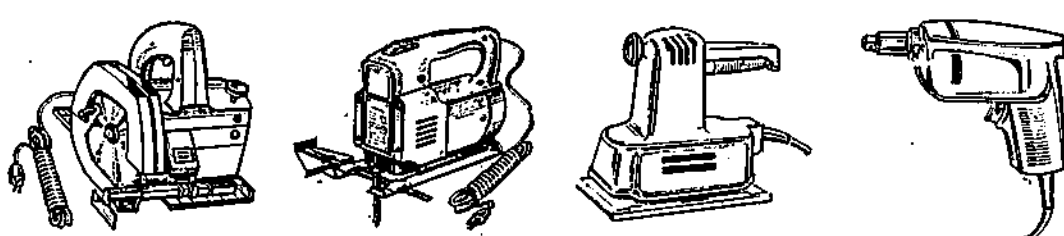

## Lottery Provides Relief But Not Entire Answer

By Senator Clifford P. Case  
The lottery system of selecting draftees, approved by the Senate last week, will provide some immediate relief to the young men of this country. It also will underscore the need for further reform necessary for a fair and equitable draft. Draft laws will find that it will increase more certainty into their personal lives but they also will find that the same web of de-ferments and varying standards

between draft boards remains. For example, a young man in one county, though with a lottery number of 34, may still find himself in the Army while his friend in the next county with the same number remains a civilian. What lottery selection by itself will accomplish is quite limited. A national drawing will be held each year in two steps. First, the 365 days of the year will be scrambled and then drawn to determine the sequence of selection. For instance, if October 24 is drawn first, then all those whose birthday falls on that date will be the first to be called by their draft boards in the next year. A second drawing will determine the alphabetical order which will be applied to these men. Each draft board by law will be required to use this schedule in determining which of their eligible men are drafted first.

The advantage of this system is that a young man will enter a one year period of maximum vulnerability at age 19, except during the first year when all registrants under 26 years of age will be subject to the drawing. If the random draw does not assign a young man a low number, the chances are that he will not be drafted except in the event of a national emergency. Unlike the present situation, in which he must wait seven years waiting to be called, he will be able to embark upon a career, reasonably sure that it will not be interrupted.

In the institution of the lottery system is only the beginning of draft reform. Whether a number drawn means induction will still depend upon the arbitrary factor where a young man happens to be registered. And there are still no national guidelines governing the administration of deferments or the decision on an individual draft board makes. For example, one board may be lenient in granting occupational deferments, in which case the pool of young men eligible for the national drawing would be reduced to the extent that an apparently favorable lottery number still could mean induction.

I voted for the lottery selection amendment before the Senate because it would have been a gross disservice to the young men of this country to delay any improvement which could be made immediately. A number of us in the Senate are continuing to press for comprehensive revision of the draft, and the Senate Armed Services

Committee has finally agreed to begin hearings in February. At these hearings I intend to call for national guidelines covering deferments, a simplified appeals process, and more central administration of the selective service system. Reform is urgent. Under the present system, a whole generation of potential leaders now is growing up with a cynical view of the obligations of national service. Some exploit the uncertainty of the system to avoid entirely their responsibilities. Others, without occupational or educational advantages, are inducted and die in Vietnam. We can and must improve the system by which our young men are selected to risk their lives for us.

December Draft Call Is 226 Men

The national call is for 9,000 men, 7,500 to be inducted into the Army and 1,500 into the Marine Corps. Also during December, 2,916 men will be forwarded to the Armed Forces Examining and Entrance Station in Newark for pre-induction physical examination.

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## Adult Education at the Forefront

NEW BRUNSWICK — The new dean of the largest degree-granting division at Rutgers, a young historian and student of urban problems, is firmly committed to the idea that adult education should be at the forefront of new developments in higher education.

Dr. Kenneth W. Wheeler has been dean since last July of University College, the sprawling, somewhat amorphous, adult college at the State University.

"We start," Dean Wheeler said in an interview, "with recognition of the fact that historically University College has been the exclusive opportunity given by the state for adult, evening, part-time degree education, but that both its purpose and the world are much different than they were when U. C. was founded in 1931."

U. C. finds itself now in a world which has seen a major cultural explosion, where people have ever increasing leisure, and where the level of education of the general public has risen sharply, Dr. Wheeler said.

"Fundamental among these changes as far as education is concerned," Dr. Wheeler said, "is the fact that nobody talks anymore about going to college to get his education. It is just one step in a life long process of education. Indications are that in the future young people will tend to drop in and out of the formal educational process, rather than making it a four-year package."

It is expected that by 1975 the rate of part-time adult to full-time young students in universities in urban settings will be two to one. And many authorities, including John W. Gardner, former secretary of Health, Education and Welfare, and Clark Kerr, former president of the University of California, have predicted that young students will rely less in the future on their four-year baccalaureate

600 adult evening students in their college careers for other activities.

"Therefore, very suddenly we are no longer the exclusive state agency for adult education in New Jersey."

All of these developments, Dean Wheeler believes, are having a profound effect on the role of University College in several ways.

They mean that:

—University College must develop more advanced courses in college education and will interrupt their college careers for other activities.

This means that many adult students will become adult part-time students, Dr. Wheeler noted.

"In response to this general demand for higher education the state has developed community colleges, and the state colleges are developing adult evening courses. Middlesex College, for example, has about 10,000

adult evening students in four years," Dr. Wheeler said.

"Therefore, very suddenly we are no longer the exclusive state agency for adult education in New Jersey."

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Some respects it must become part of an "upper division" adult, part-time college to take care of graduates of the community colleges, both day and night, and the increasing number of former students in four-year colleges who will decide to continue their education piecemeal while working.

The adult college must attempt to meet some of the impact of the cultural explosion by "reaching out toward new directions in higher education." This means offering numerous courses, perhaps in some cases short, noncredit and off-campus, in such fields as the theater, mathematics, and politics, for the mature adult who is interested in individual cultural growth rather than a strictly degree program.

It must move forward in meeting the needs of mature adults who desire to increase their professional competence through courses on the latest developments in their fields. University College has been developing a number of specializations over the recent years designed to meet these needs in such fields as police science, labor studies, small business management and municipal government.

It must continue to contribute to the larger and ever increasing measure of the kind of essential expertise U. C. is uniquely qualified to provide if the cities are to survive.

It is on this last point that Dean Wheeler is particularly qualified to speak.

At 39, Dean Wheeler has already carved out a reputation for himself as the former executive director of one urban educational complex, Metro Center at Boston University, a lecturer in the history of urban planning and a specialist in urban and regional development.

A professor of history at Rutgers as well as dean of University College, Dr. Wheeler is the author of the new textbook, "To Wear a City's Crown," a study of the early development of a

designed to answer fundamental questions raised by the growth patterns of the city.

He believes that University College is really uniquely suited to meet the problems of the city because it is the only degree-granting college in the State University with centers in five major New Jersey cities—New Brunswick, Newark, Camden, Jersey City and Paterson.

Working with and helping the cities disadvantaged is hardly a new thing with University College, Dr. Wheeler said, in pointing out that last year there were almost as many blacks enrolled in U. C. as in the other liberal arts and graduate schools of Rutgers combined.

All this means that University College, the largest degree-granting unit at Rutgers with something more than 8,000 students, has the opportunity and responsibility to respond to the needs of the city that other Rutgers colleges don't have, Dr. Wheeler said.

And as a specialist in urban history and planning, he had this significant statement to add:

"The first thing that anyone making a comparative study of cities discovers is the great uniqueness of each city and that it seems extremely important in our educational efforts that we respond to the peculiar needs of each city. We must find which of our responses are most appropriate in each case."

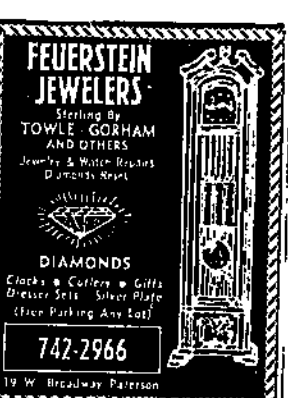

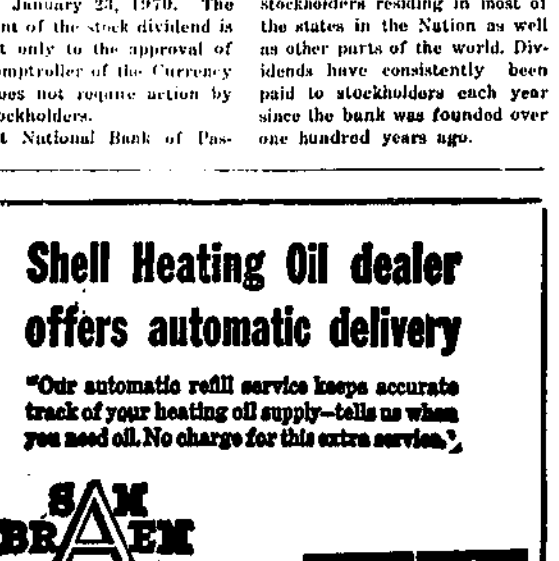

## COLD - Current Concern for Winter Months

"COLD" is a matter of current concern to local pharmacists.

Not, point out the New Jersey Pharmaceutical Association, the impending temperature drop that approaching Winter brings, nor yet the common ailments invariably accompanying it, but—well, let the president of the professional society explain.

"The cold we fear," says Albert C. Meyer of Wood-Ridge, is an epidemic of worrisome conditions in combination with the holiday season.

"Our fears involve Cigarettes, Colds, Liquor and Drugs in relation to driving—and, in the case of COLD index. Surely any one can be dangerous on the highway; together they're deadly."

Meyer said a million crippling and costly crashes each year—more than half the total highway accident toll—are attributed to one or more of the four factors.

"And the percentage increases in Winter, even more around the holiday season," he added.

"It isn't solely the alcoholic, although loss of daylight hours has an effect. But even more serious than longer night driving is the upsurge in imbibing that occurs this time of year.

"People eat more, drink more, make more, drive more, even with the seasonal increase in driving. Correlated with cold weather and head and chest colds, they add up to what we call 'winter danger'."

Meyer said cigarettes and the exhalation produced by automobile exhausts combine to create a smoggy atmosphere that not only irritates and interferes with vision, but also causes asthma, bronchitis, emphysema, and other respiratory ailments.

"When these conditions are combined with winter fog, the results can be tragic. Carbon monoxide alone appears in cigarette smoke in concentration 400 times greater than the level adjudged safe by health authorities. It combines with hemoglobin in the blood to cut down drastically on the desperately needed oxygen supply."

As to the "L" and "D" Meyer, he thinks the public is beginning to become aware of the possibility of dangerous interaction between liquor and drugs, "but not fast enough, as the accident rate shows."

"The hard, brutal fact is that drugs, drinking and driving simply don't mix," he said flatly.

"At best, driving while partying is an invitation to disaster. If the drinking driver also is taking medication for flu or other ailments, even a common cold, the invitation too often becomes a reality."

"Drugs such as sedatives, tranquilizers, amphetamines and antihistamines can in themselves produce side effects that make driving extremely difficult. They can temporarily impair vision, cause dizziness, interfere with concentration. Judgment is undermined, inhibitions relaxed, reflexes slowed."

"When taken along with alcohol, they can be lethal. The combination causes an elevated response far beyond the experience of either drug or drink alone. One enhances the property of the other."

"We as professional members of the health team are deeply concerned about the welfare of our patients, so we urge all to keep in mind the menace of COLD—and act prudently in their own protection."

### Leftovers Can Make Exciting Family Meals

If your family turns up their noses every time you serve leftovers, chances are you're serving the same old second time around.

With a little imagination and some planning, you can create new dishes which your family will be hard pressed to identify as leftovers.

Uncooked vegetables — peas, carrots, green or yellow beans, lima, or corn — can be combined, singly or in combination, with a freshly-made cream sauce and served over rice or spaghetti. For a main course idea, add cubes of cooked ham or chicken to your creamed vegetables, and perhaps some sautéed onion, green pepper or pineapple for added flavor.

A molded salad or fruit compote completes this delectable meal.

Most cooks think that because a salad has been mixed with dressing the dressing portion is not worth saving. Actually, the salad greens make an excellent topping for hamburgers or cheeseburgers. Just place the burger on a toasted bun and top with a spoonful of salad and a fresh slice of tomato.

Meat, too, can be successfully

disguised when presented for the second time. Hamburgers or meatloaf can be broken up and added to chili or spaghetti sauce; roast pork is excellent when cubed, broiled in a little oil and added to chop-ony or chow mein; and even hot dogs have a double life—slice and add them to hash, or split pen soup or use them to top a pot of baked beans.

Casseroles are generally a easy way to change the appearance and flavor of left-over meat. Baked Capricorn combines sautéed with hash, a meat which might otherwise be hard to disguise the second time around.

**BAKED CAPRICORN**  
4 medium-sized baked potatoes  
3 cups leftover lamb  
2 1/2 cups Silver Pine sauce  
sautéed, drained

The mixture may also be baked and served in potato skins. For flavor variety, add 1/2 cup chopped, sautéed onions or 1/2 cup dark brown sugar.
