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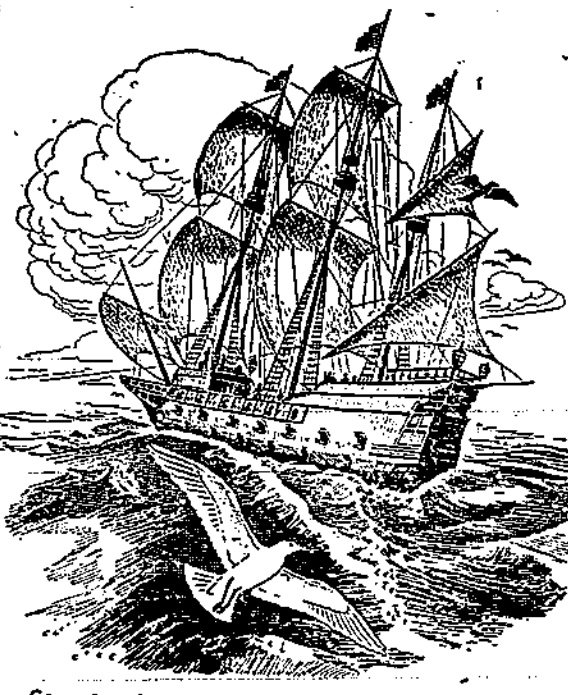

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## GROW YOUR OWN GARDEN

under the direction of the Cancer Committee of the New Jersey State Medical Society, will indicate where these prevention centers are needed, and what where additional facilities should be provided for diagnosis, treatment and care of cancer patients.

The national research program sponsored by the society is directed to finding the cause of cancer, now unknown, and new methods of prevention and treatment.

At present the only effective treatment known are surgery, radiation and X-rays, and these can be most successfully in the early stages of the disease. There are quacks and fakirs who promise cures and other treatments. They should be shunned and exposed when found.

"When discovered early, 95 per cent of lip and skin cancers and 85 per cent of breast cancers can be cured by treatments now known. Yet in the United States the records show that there are 3,000 deaths annually from skin cancer alone."

"Contributions being received by the society," says the statement, "indicate that people everywhere are being aroused to the need for combating cancer."

"Our war is over, but the war on cancer has just begun," wrote Gene E. Kline, M.D., in a letter to the American Cancer Society and the National Cancer Society.
