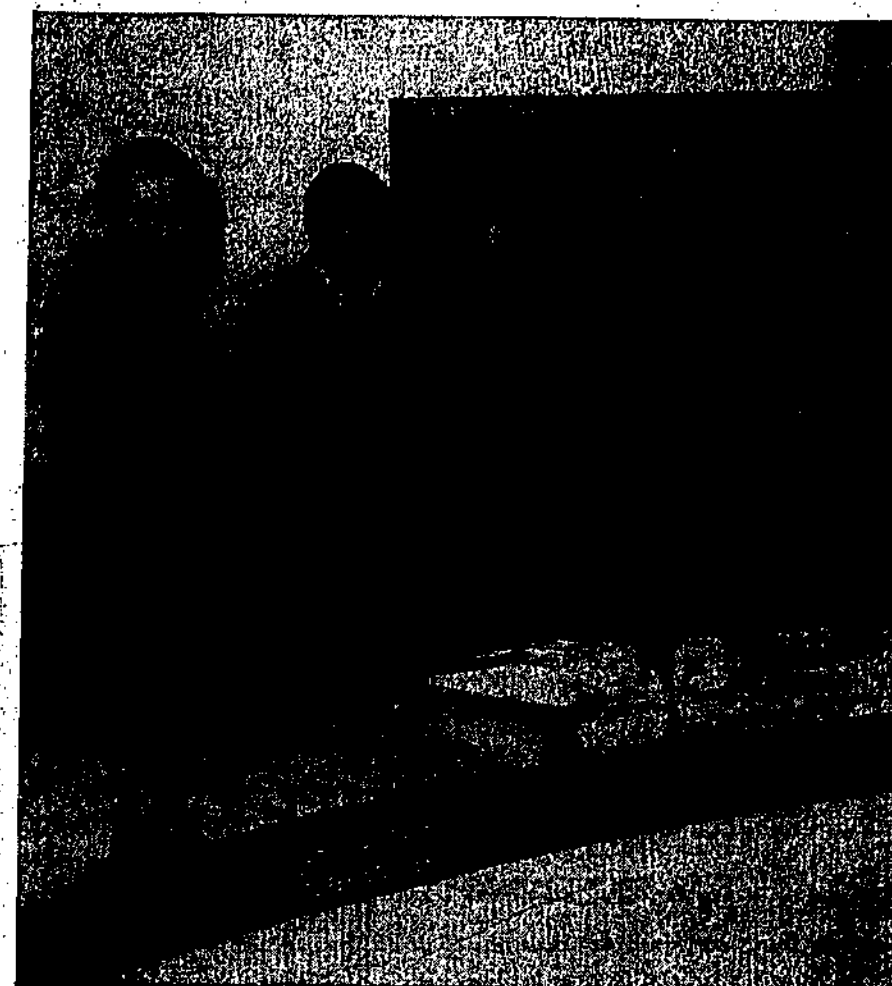

Van Ry, Criscenzo, Girgenti, Englehardt Win Seats on Board of Education

Two newcomers and one incumbent were elected to full-year terms on the Hawthorne Board of Education Tuesday as a total of 2287 of the borough's registered voters turned out.

Trusted Hank Van Ry, who had served a one-year term, was top vote-getter with a total of 1461. Mrs. Rose Criscenzo, who will be the only woman on the board, came in second with 1394 votes. John Girgenti was third with 1148 votes.

The budget lost solidly in all districts except Washington, and Criscenzo pulled three districts, Lincoln with 386, High School, 239 and Jefferson, 226. Girgenti carried Washington School with 185, but was fourth in the expansion and parochial aid issues. In 1970, 2291 were cast and in 1972, there were 2160.

The reorganization meeting of the Hawthorne School Board will be held Monday, February 19 at 8 p.m. At this session, the president and vice-president will be elected and the committee chairmen will be named for the year 1973.

Washington Ave. Sewer Project In 1973 Municipal Budget

Hawthorne's 1973 municipal budget of \$1,100,437.31 includes appropriations for a Washington Avenue and Royal Avenue sewer project. "At the Board of Commissioners meeting held February 7, notification was received from HUD in answer to an application made by the borough that Hawthorne would not receive federal funds.

Mayor Louis Bay II commented on the federal government statement that no new commitments would be issued. "The decision is unfortunate after we waited so long to obtain federal funds for sewer and water projects on the Goffle Hill and Washington Avenue areas. We will continue to make use of every avenue possible to get federal funds for these projects

and if this fails, we will use money from Federal Revenue Sharing funds."

Revenue sharing funds are listed in the budget in four entitlement periods: Jan. 1 to June 30, 1972—\$44,526; July 1 to Dec. 31, 1972—\$20,546; July 1 to June 30, 1973—\$22,723 (for a total of \$87,795) under the heading Washington Avenue Sewer Improvement Program.

In addition to the \$104,411 appropriated for Royal Avenue Washington Avenue Sewer Improvement Program there is another \$200,000 for capital improvements, which has not been broken down.

Revenue sharing funds will also be used for a sanitary sewer infiltration engineering study in the amount of \$12,000 from the entitlement period of January 1 to June 30, 1972.

The total budget reflects an increase of \$256,285.05 over last year's figure of \$1,000,417.65. The tax rate from the municipal budget is 3.3 per \$100 of assessed valuation, no increase over the tax rate of 1972.

A public hearing on the budget is scheduled for Wednesday, March 7 at 8 p.m. in the Municipal Building.

Hawthorne could be affected by a move to trade Elmwood Park and the borough voting districts in the State. The district is under consideration by the State Legislative District Reapportionment Commission.

The plan is to add the Republican stronghold of Hawthorne to the Bergen County district now held by Republicans Garret Hagedorn, Elmwood Park, which is more evenly divided between the two major parties, and would add Democrats in Passaic County.

The final date for completion of the reapportionment may be set for February 22.

Five Students Named Outstanding Teenagers

Five Hawthorne High School students have been selected as Outstanding Teenagers of America for 1972.

Selection for the Outstanding Teenagers awards program automatically qualifies these students for further state, regional and national honors and scholarships totaling \$7,000. Local nominees are: James Kosch, John Pledstone, Jr., Judith Byras, Terri Tantis and Karen White.

Nominated by their principals, the Outstanding Teenagers of America are chosen from individual schools across the country for excellence in academic achievement and community service. The local students will now vie for the Outstanding Teenager of the Year Trophy to be presented by the state's governor. Similar trophies will be presented to the winners in other states. The state winners are selected by the Outstanding Teenager Awards Selection Committee, in cooperation with the Board of Advisors.

The 51 state winners will be eligible for awards totaling \$7,000. One boy and one girl will be chosen for national scholarships of \$1,000 each to be used at the college or university of their choice. Ten regional winners will also be selected from the remaining state winners to receive \$200 regional scholarships.

In recognizing the special talents of these Outstanding Teenagers, author and entertainer Arthur Godfrey, said, "...You are an inspiration to your elders as well as your peers."

Under the guidance of the Board of Advisors, the Outstanding Teenagers of America program was created to encourage young people to take full advantage of the opportunities in our country. The awards are presented each spring, and biographies of all those honored are recorded in the annual volume, "Outstanding Teenagers of America."

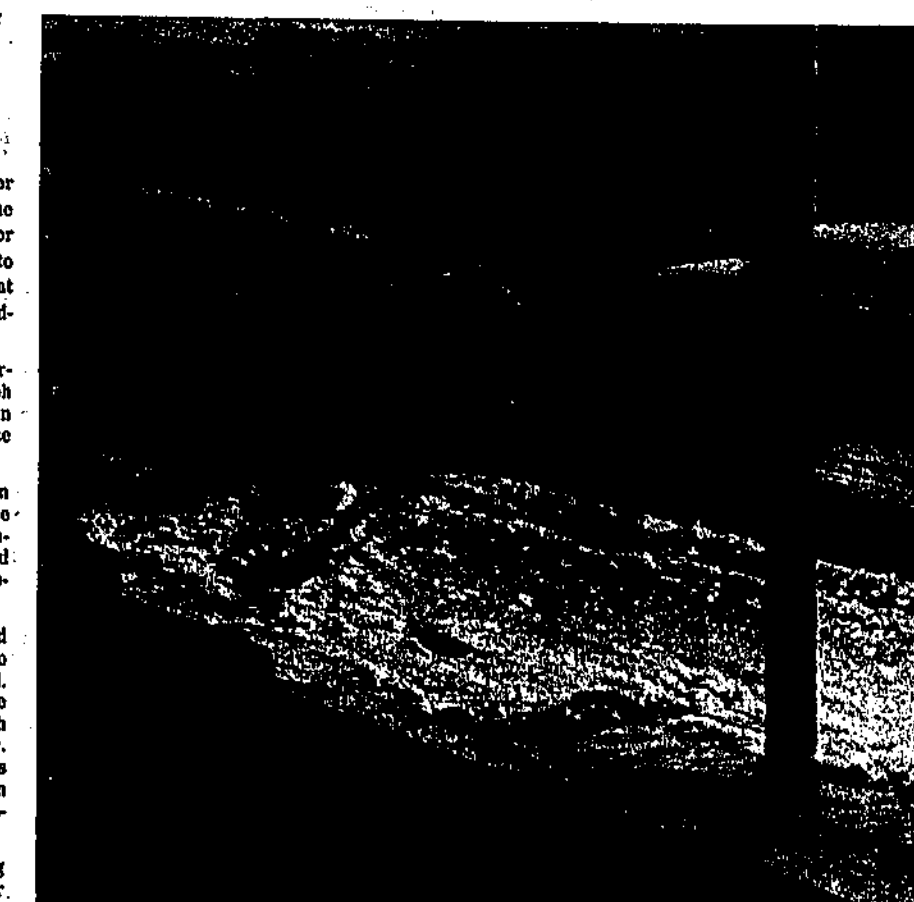
Mrs. Alfred Menove, chairman, has appointed Mrs. Ralph Malmendro as book chairman and Mrs. Donald Reustra as public chairman.

THE PEOPLE CHOOSE THEIR TRUSTEES

Hawthorne voters have maintained an interest in school elections in the past four years that has consistently brought almost a fourth of those eligible to the polls. This year, some Board members said there were no issues, yet this was the second highest vote in the four-year span.

As pointed out in last week's Press editorial, 200 votes usually spell the difference of budget defeat or approval. On February 13, it was 191 that caused the current expense portion to fail. The capital outlay section, however, lost by 333 tallies.

When the Borough Commissioners get done with their review and recommend an amount to be cut, we wonder how the new Board of Education will consider these capital outlay appropriations. We question whether windows at Lincoln School or the home ec room at Roosevelt or the bathrooms at Washington will be axed in favor of capital improvements for the athletic field.

Only one of the three full term victors dared to take a stand on the issue of whether more stands at the field could be considered "frills." She said she would prefer to make educational needs be the priority.

The re-elected Board member for a three-year term questioned why the elementary school improvements had been neglected so long, but gave no public statement on what he considered a priority.

The third full-term victor, though frequently mentioning his master's degree in public administration, would not comment on any of the specifics of the budget during campaign.

Only time will tell whether any of the three, who were the overwhelming choice of the voters, will have any influence over the budget cuts, which relate to the educational future of our children.

The other facet is how much influence can be kept from them by the next Board president and the backroom decision prior to next Monday on which Board members head which committees.
