Science Proves Misses Not Fault of Recoil.

Science has now proved that the recoil of a rifle does not cause the bullet to miss the target. This was proved by a special photograph which was taken by a special camera which helps produce photographs in three dimensions.

C. C. Barry, chief ballistics of the research laboratory of the Western Cartridge Company division of Olin Industries, Inc., mounted a Model 24 deer gun in a recoil rest which simulated as nearly as possible the conditions under which a rifle is fired from the human shoulder.

With the muzzle of the Winchester resting on a wood block, Barry made the three photographs at the right, which proved conclusively that the rifle does not kick until the bullet has left it.

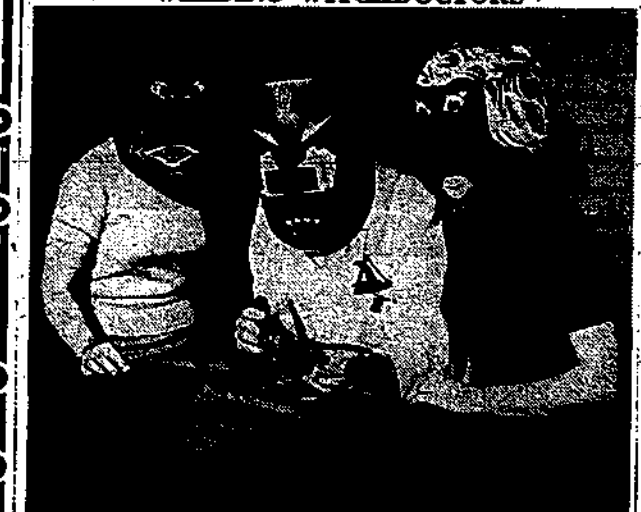

The Federal Government should build enough veterans' hospitals, fully staffed by competent medical men, so that beds would be available for all veterans in need of treatment. Under the new plan, the VA contracts for a standard hospital service and gives the veterans with service-connected disabilities a free choice of doctors. The contracts with doctors' associations are negotiated separately.
