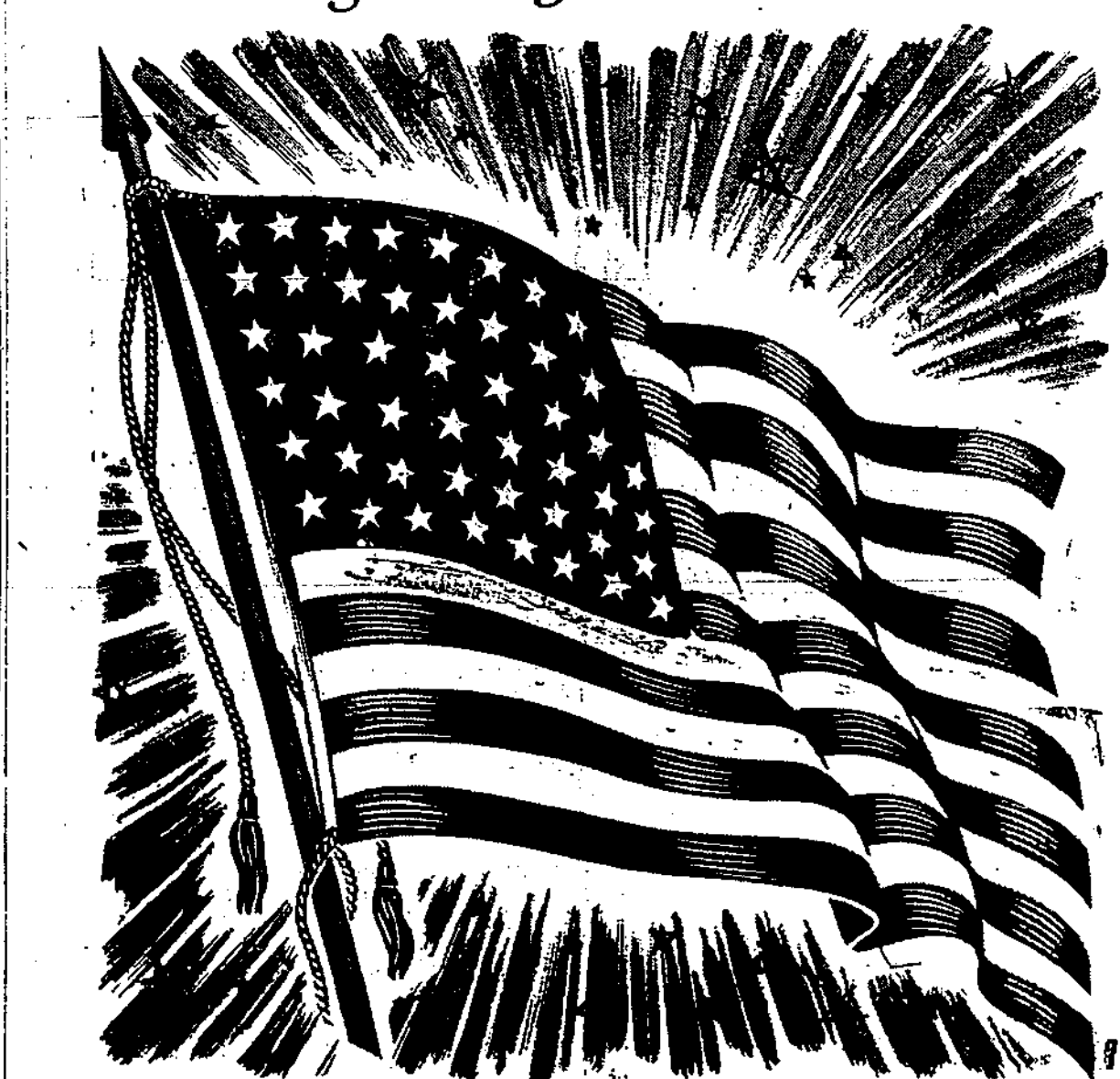

New Gas Ration Registration

To Register At Public Elementary Schools July 9-10-11

Windshield Stickers To Designate Ration Rating Of Car Owners

Trenton, N. J., July 2.—Official instructions for the guidance of car owners in connection with the forthcoming registration for permanent gasoline rationing, were issued here today in a special bulletin by James Kerner, Jr., State Director of the Office of Price Administration.

According to Kerner's bulletin all owners of passenger cars with a few exceptions will register for the basic "A" gasoline ration book on July 9, 10, and 11; and all owners of trucks, buses, taxis, boats and other vehicles included in a "Service" category will register at local rationing boards on the same dates and after. The permanent rationing system is scheduled to go into effect on July 22.

The bulletin tabulated essential information for car owners as follows:

"1. The dates for the registration of gasoline rationing program are Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, July 9, 10, and 11.

"2. In general, registration will be held at public elementary schools during the hours of 1 p. m. to 8 p. m. There may be local variations.

Roosevelt Appeals to People of Conquered Nations of Europe to Revolt Against Their Axis Masters

President Roosevelt, welcoming Mexico and the Philippines into the great United Nations alliance against the Axis Powers, in a White House Flag Day ceremony, appealed to the people of Germany, Japan and the conquered nations of Europe and Asia to revolt against their Axis masters for freedom of speech and religion, freedom from want and from fear.

He asserted confidently that "We of the United Nations have the power and the men and the will at last to assure man's heritage."

The people of the United Nations were "taking the sword

from the oppressor's hands," and with it, "they will destroy those tyrants," he said.
