Drive Against Used Car Black Market Announced By District OPA Director

U. S. Attorney's Office Will Also Act.

Newark, N. J., July 3. — Following announcement of a joint drive against the used car black market by District OPA and the U. S. Attorney's Office, District OPA Director Richard J. Tarrant disclosed that his office has been interviewing recent car purchasers for the past two months.

Tarrant said letters have been sent to recent purchasers of new and used cars inviting them to meet with OPA enforcement officials to review the transactions for possible price violations. Of 150 new car purchasers invited during June, more than 50 have already responded, and 18 over-calling violations have been established and referred to the U. S. Attorney for prosecution. Overcharges on new cars range from \$100 to \$400, usually paid in cash and with no receipt given by the dealer.

Of 54 used car purchasers invited to "pull all" to OPA, 37 have responded and 15 violations established.

In addition, Tarrant revealed referrals totaling \$52,112 have gone to 197 New Jersey used car purchasers who reported black.

CONTACT USES FOR JOBS IN LOS ANGELES

Job opportunities in the Los Angeles area for engineers, draftsmen, and estimators experienced in working with structural or plate steel, especially industrial buildings, were announced today by Henry Geller, manager of the Paterson United States Employment Service.

These are "key" positions, Geller said, and filling them will create additional jobs for other types of workers.

Geller said the structural engineers should have a degree in civil engineering and preferably hold a structural engineer's license although this requirement can be waived in some cases. Duties will include designing industrial buildings, bridges, dams, trusses, and other structural steel erections.

The draftsmen assigned to make detail drawings for the fabrication of pressure vessels, tanks, and miscellaneous plate work should have at least two years of previous experience. Other draftsmen are needed to check all types of fabricated structural steel drawings.

To qualify as an estimator, a man must have had sufficient experience to enable him to estimate material and labor costs involved in structural steel or plate steel fabrication.
