

Pointing out that while canker worms sometimes devour part or all of a leaf. Rex explained that clm leaf beetles chew the epidermis of the lower side of the leaves, exposing the framework of the leaf. Leaves severely damaged by elm leaf beetles turn brown by early July, and wilting follows. He advises owners to examine the fallen leaves to see whether insect feeding or disease is responsible for falling leaves and discolored foliage.


