## BOROUGH OF HAWTHORNE STARTS SUITS

Hope To Recover Money Paid Fictitious Persons  
LARGE SUM  
Series of Similar Court Actions to Follow

An echo of the recent investigation that resulted in the jailing and fining of several former officials and employees of Hawthorne for their conspiracy to defraud the borough through the medium of false bills for materials was heard last Friday afternoon, when the municipality instituted a \$17,684.19 Supreme Court Bill.

Papers in the suit were filed in Sheriff Thomas E. Manly's office, by the former Assistant Prosecutor John D. Masterton as special attorney for the borough.

Payment of 30 cents in the aggregate sum of \$17,684.19 in the form of checks, which were forged, is charged against the defendant institution. The borough seeks to hold the bank liable on the ground that it took from the municipal account the funds with which the checks were paid on the alleged forged endorsements.

Charges Failure To Pay  
Failure on the part of the bank to pay the borough's checks to the payees designated thereon also is charged in the bill of complaint. The payees on the checks in question included John Phillips, Wm. Simpson, Edward Stewart, Charles Ackerman and Charles Wilson.

There, according to evidence unearched in the course of the recent investigation, were the names of fictitious contractors employed by the alleged conspirators in making out false bills for materials and presenting them to the borough for payment.

In addition to the return of the money allegedly paid out on these checks, the borough demands interest.

## NOT READY FOR COURT SAYS DUNN

Dobler Brothers Trial Postponed Two Weeks

STATE TO DELAY

Prosecutor Says It Will Be Held Next Month

Trial of the Dobler Brothers was postponed for at least two weeks Monday because the state is not ready to move a conspiracy indictment against them.

The investigation of the alleged illegal banking transactions which the state says netted the brothers approximately \$100,000 is not yet completed.

Prosecutor Arthur C. Dunn, in announcing the trial postponement, said the case positively will be moved this month most likely within the next two weeks.

"The investigation is not fully completed," he said. "This matter is more complex than we contemplated."

Harry R. Dobler and James County, president and secretary-treasurer of the "Dobler Brothers" Trust Co., were tried today on an indictment charging them with conspiracy. The indictment is one of four returned against them in connection with the investigation of the affairs of the southeast bank.

The case comes to trial today in the County Court.

The average rate of soil conserving payments in Passaic County under the terms of the 1935 Agricultural Conservation program will be \$1000 an acre, Harold E. Vekryn, Passaic County Agent, announced this week.

The rate for each individual farm, however, will depend on the way the productivity of the farm compares with the average productivity of all the farms in the county.

Soil conserving payments will be made this year to farmers who divert some of their acreage of soil depleting crops to soil conserving crops.

## SHORTER HOURS HIGHER WAGES PREDICTS FORD

Motor Car Industry Still New—Many Changes

A quarter of a century from now, says Henry Ford in an interview with S. J. Weist in the June Motorman Magazine, people will look back at these times in much the same way as we now do at the economic era of the world's development.

However, he explains that while improvements are taking place and new things are being created, it does not follow that old things must be abandoned, if there is any good in them.

"Automobiles," says Mr. Ford, "will not come into 1960 even though the automobile has been absolutely perfected. But there is much still to be done in automobiles. Give us a few years more, and the automobile will be improved and refined beyond all present imagination. Motor-car manufacturing is still a new industry. There will be changes for the better in almost every part of the car."

"All our machinery will be higher and better. This is true not only of automobile machinery but of machinery in general. Almost every mechanism today is unnecessarily overbuilt with weight—due to a system of late-looking directions; manufacturers have been too busy selling material instead of doing anything that is new."

"We can speak of the future," he continues, "without taking into thoughtful consideration just what the last few years have seen in the increased employment of agricultural products in manufacturing."

**WHY NOT TELL THE TRUTH?**  
When we built our Disposal plant it was supposed to be a modernly equipped unit efficient and sufficient to meet the needs of our borough for some years to come.

Within a few days of the present administration taking office and assuming responsibility for the proper care and operation of this plant, they were informed by Dr. Smith and Chief Engineer Van Dyne of the Passaic Valley Sewerage Commission that unless conditions in the operation of our disposal plant were radically changed, they (The Passaic Valley Sewerage Commission) would be compelled to take drastic action to terminate the nuisance created by the unclean flow from our final tanks into the river.

Many of the changes suggested by the state engineers were immediately made at great expense to our borough but of assured benefit to the health of the community. New pump connections made, and a new foundation constructed for the care and proper operation of our sludge bed as well as many other minor though important changes. One major and important change was held in abeyance because of its impossible and tremendous cost to the taxpayers. But because of a fortunate break caused by the institution of the Works Progress Administration our borough Engineer Salvador Minionville was enabled to have this change initiated by the local unemployed under the supervision and control of the Federal Government officials.

This change was the washing and cleansing of our filter bed which was found to be in a polluted and deplorable mess caused by reason of the fact that, when built, the engineer and the contractor in charge deliberately ignored the accepted and authorized specifications, which called for approximately 5500 cubic yards of special graded stone, which must be clean, hard and free from dust.

Here is a copy of the specifications, Filter Material Item 5 "Under item 5 the contractor shall furnish and place stone of GRADED SIZES in the sprinkling filter, as shown on the drawings. The filter material shall consist of genuine trap rock. The material shall be laid in a twelve inch layer of four to eight inch trap rock laid over and around the tile under drains on top of which layer shall be placed screened trap rock 2 to 3/4 inch in size until the bed has reached the required depth. ALL ROCK MUST BE CLEAN, HARD AND FREE FROM DUST. Samples must be submitted to the Engineer for approval before the placement. GREAT CARE SHALL BE TAKEN TO ENJOY THE CHANNEL, TILE OR TO MOVE IT OUT OF ALIGNMENT. The volume shall be measured in place and payment made accordingly. The unit price bid per cubic yard shall include furnishing and placing the stone and all labor, tools and materials connected herewith.

When the W. P. A. operations on this project got well under way it was instantly revealed that instead of stone being laid and placed in layers of twelve inches, it was dumped in by truck or bucket any old way. Instead of placing stone of from four to eight inches required by specification, the contractor delivered and the engineer passed stone running 1/4" to over 20".

Instead of this stone being laid over and around the tile under drains it was deliberately dumped on the top of the top of the tile drains thereby breaking them and destroying their future utility and use.

Instead of placing screened trap rock which must be clean, hard and free from dust running from 2" to 3/4" in size we now find stone of various sizes clogged with quarry grit and dust, and at various places packed so hard the men working on the project, were forced to use picks to loosen up the supposedly screened stone.

Through the clogged condition of this stone and the destroyed and broken under drain laid at the foundation of this bed it has been absolutely impossible to operate our Disposal plant in an efficient and healthy manner. Above all it has been impossible to eradicate the filth from the flow running from our final tanks into the river because the proper seepage through our filter bed has been hindered by its clogged condition, and because of its clogged condition has retained and built up such substance that has retarded the correct and cleaning purpose of the filter bed. And this is the cause of all complaint from the State Authorities.

This is one of the costs the taxpayers must pay for improper inspection on all public contracts. As a suggestion why shouldn't something be done to start action against the proper persons to recover the cost of putting the filter bed in the manner in which the specifications called for? Why shouldn't this be referred to the Borough Attorney for an opinion? Why has none of the watch dogs of the treasury raised their voice in protest to this flagrant condition? The only logical conclusion is these individuals are fearful of hurting their friends. This same sub-

Regardless of all the carping criticism leveled at the heads of our official family, we have to appreciate the many worth while things they are trying to accomplish in these trying times but none or more worth than Mayor Matland's insistence that this Disposal plant problem be thoroughly and finally settled to the satisfaction of the local public and the State Authorities.

## BAD READING PUBLIC ENEMY SAYS REPORT

Costs More to Support Criminal Than To Buy 500 Books

Bad reading is "Public Enemy" No. 2, in its influence in making criminals. Association with other criminals is No. 1, and bad movies are No. 3. It costs as much to support one criminal in prison for a

year as 500 books would cost, including the cost of trials and of the crime itself. Yet the supply of good books for children and for boys and girls in their teens is seriously inadequate in these times when budgets for public libraries have been cut, owing to the needs for municipal economy. That is one reason for the second annual "drive" for books, Citizens' Committee for the Public Library, conducted by the Public Library Commission throughout the State. Children's books, and other books, should be left at any public library, or library branch, or at a home in cities where they have been designated as receiving stations by the mayors.

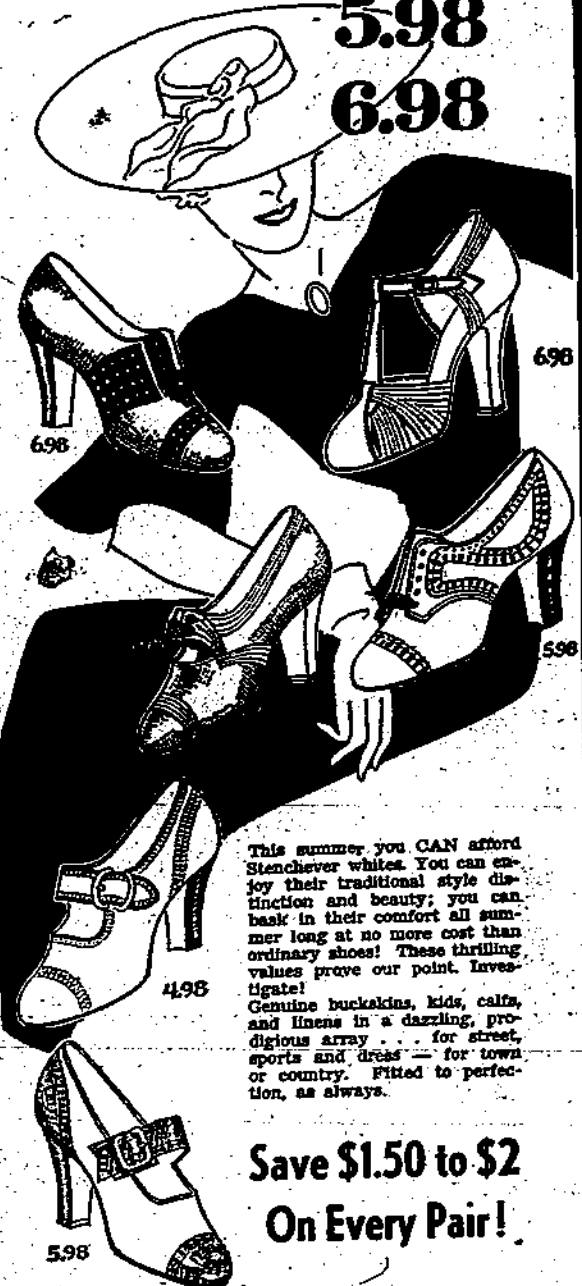

You said "the requirements for seedling, applying lime, and spraying poison and phosporus have been listed separately, so that each farmer can choose the combination which best meets his needs."

The New Jersey list of practices was recommended by the State Committee in charge of the new program, and approved by the Secretary of Agriculture Henry A. Wallace.

Under this program, the payments will cover half to three quarters of the per acre cash cost to the farmer of carrying out the soil building allowance, which is \$1. for each acre in converting crops on the farm in 1935. These acres may be either acres diverted this year from soil depleting crops, or acres that already were in soil conserving crops.
