## BAGWORM MOST PREVALENT

Easy To Recognize - Bag Cigar Shaped Silken Sac

The bagworm, one of the most harmful looking insects that we

have here, has been very abundant during the past few years, especially throughout this area. In the past most of the calls we have had concerning it show that the bag-

worm has already eaten a large part of the foliage off many of the trees and shrubs, particularly evergreens, such as arbor vitae, junipers and spruce, which are commonly used in landscaping and foundation plantings around homes.

Because of the damage of the bag and twigs stuck on the side of them, one is liable to overlook them until after the damage is done, and then you cannot do anything until next year.

Often, the only remedy that can be immediately applied when bagworms are found feeding on plants, is to collect and burn them, or otherwise destroy the insects. But picking and burning the bags is very worthwhile even if the caterpillars are through eating, because many of the bags that hang on plants over winter contain the eggs for the following year's supply of bagworms. Spraying is a successful method of combating bagworms, provided you apply the correct type of spray and apply it spray thoroughly and at the right time. Spraying can only operate satisfactorily if applied when the worms are eating vigorously, and especially when they are young.

Young bagworms usually begin to appear on plants about June 15, but they are quite small and even then are covered with tiny cases of silk and the last fragments of silk are harder to discover than when they have become larger, but careful examinations at intervals

will reveal them if they are present.

The spray the entomologists recommend for controlling the bagworm consists of: Powdered lead arsenate, 8 teaspoonfuls; 1 quart of water; 1 gallon. before we are called in on the case.

There are a rather common epidemic of these quite a few years ago in the Albion section of Clifton and only the effective work done by the shade tree department there was able to keep them under control.

This is an easy worm to recognize because the worm is a light colored brilliant caterpillar growing to about an inch long. The unusual thing about it is that the work itself is always encased in the "bag". The bag is somewhat cigar-shaped, silken sac, sometimes as much as two inches long. The outer surface of the bag is usually covered with bits of foliage and twigs from the plant or plants on which the worm is feeding. This is the unusual thing about these worms, because they look like cocoons and most cocoons are inactive, and it is sort of startling to see some cocoons that actually move.

Because of the damage of the bag and twigs stuck on the side of them, one is liable to overlook them until after the damage is done, and then you cannot do anything until next year.

Often, the only remedy that can be immediately applied when bagworms are found feeding on plants, is to collect and burn them, or otherwise destroy the insects. But picking and burning the bags is very worthwhile even if the caterpillars are through eating, because many of the bags that hang on plants over winter contain the eggs for the following year's supply of bagworms. Firemen's Field Day To Be Staged Saturday, July 3rd

TRENTON, June 9.—Methods of attacking fires both from air and land will be demonstrated at the New Jersey State Firemen's Field Day to be staged at the New Jersey State Fair Grounds on Saturday, July 3rd.

The general committee, of which David J. Howell is chairman, is making arrangements with Col. Leontides Coyle, head of the New Jersey Forest Fire fighting force, to stage an exhibition under the State plane, with contact cars and other ing firemen and their friends may look on an accurate idea of the methods used in detecting and fighting forest fires. In addition there will be a spectacular display of "fighting the flames" by city firemen equipped with the latest devices.

The program will be an all-day affair starting with inspection of fire apparatus in the morning, a parade and concert in the afternoon, and in the evening there will be a presentation of prizes, a mass band concert, and in recognition of the celebration of Independence Day there will be a spectacular fireworks display.

The general committee, meeting every Tuesday night at the headquarters office, 5 West River Street, Trenton, is receiving entries of fire companies desiring to participate in the parade or contests. Valuable trophies and money awards have been provided by the committee and blanks may be obtained by addressing S. E. Barrett, the managing director of the celebration.

Four thousand trees will be transplanted to the site of the 1939 World's Fair in San Francisco.
