School System Hard Hit By Employees Resignation

System Faces Shortage In Clerical Department As Well As In Physical Training Personnel

Four appointments to the teaching staff of the local schools were made by the Hawthorne Board of Education on the recommendation of the committee on education at the regular meeting at Lafayette School last evening with President Louis H. Postling.

Miss Anita Crivelli was appointed to a permanent position on the teaching staff of the high school for the school year 1942-43 at \$1,800 per year.

Miss Eleanor Klepper was appointed to a temporary position on the teaching staff of the high school beginning with the school year 1942-43 at \$1,500 per year.

Irving Bierbaum was appointed to a temporary position in the manual training department of the high school beginning with the school year 1942-43 at \$1,500 per year.

The fourth appointment was that of Miss Eleanor Polliciano to a permanent position on the teaching staff of the elementary school at \$1,400 per year.

The school board's shortage in athletic instructors was nearly matched in the clerical department last night with the announcement of two resignations. Miss Elma Pappas submitted her resignation as clerical assistant to the district clerk and supervising principal to be effective May 29, and Mrs. Edith Bradley Floyd submitted her resignation to be effective May 29.

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873,057 GAS RATION CARDS ISSUED IN N. J.

Final totals on the gasoline rationing registration released here today by the Office of James Terney, Jr., State Director of the Office of Price Administration show that 873,057 gasoline ration cards were issued to New Jersey car owners.

The approximate proportion of categories is as follows: A cards, 25%; B-1 cards, 25%; B-2 cards, 25%; C cards, 40%; and X cards, 8%.

The proportion of X cards issued in New Jersey, raising of which is 2% below the average for all rationed states.

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12 PER CENT DECREASE FOR JUNE QUOTA

On Tires and Tubes

Trenton, N. J., May 28.—Tire and tube quotas for June show an average decrease from May quotas of approximately 12% in passenger tires, retreads and tubes, and a reduction of about 6% in the truck, bus, and farm tractor tires, according to an announcement by James Kerney, Jr., State Director of the Office of Price Administration. The reduction was attributed by rationing officials to the decrease in the number of tires and tubes to be used in the repair of war equipment.

The State quotas of tires and tubes to be distributed to eligible persons by local rationing boards during June are as follows:

For passenger vehicles and motorcycles: 1,500 new tires, 26,501 retreaded tires, and 14,682 tubes.

For trucks, buses, farm tractors and other heavy vehicles: 7,500 new tires, 10,704 retreaded tires, and 9,682 tubes.

May quotas allotted New Jersey were: 24,688 new passenger tires, 24,688 retreaded tires, 16,711 passenger tubes, 7,500 truck and tractor tires, and 14,682 tubes.
