

This is little short of amazing, when you consider the tax load the automobile owner is carrying now. There is no doubt that he is more heavily taxed than any other class of citizen. He pays a State gasoline tax of 3-cents a gallon. On top of that comes the Federal gasoline tax of 11/2 cents a gallon. Total: 41/2-cents tax on each gallon of gasoline he buys in _

But that's not all, by any means. He pays registration fees, inspection fees, and driver's license fees. It costs the average New Jersey motorist \$70 a year in these special taxes alone-and, of course, he pays all other regular taxes besides. Why, then, should the motorist be singled out to pay still higher taxes? He can't afford to pay them-but, more than that, it simply doesn't make sense to ask motorists to foot the bill for a Veterans' Bonus that is owed by all the people of the

If the Legislature votes this Bonus, we hope it will have the fairness to enact a tax provision whereby every taxpayer will pay his proportionate share of the bill.

Who's to blame?

Union leaders representing less than one-tenth of railroad employes reject recommendations of President's Emergency board—refuse to negotiate except on their own terms—threaten to paralyze nation by strike!

THE LEADERS of three railroad tmions, representing less than one-tenth of all railroad employees, have called a railroad strike that would paralyze the nation.

These leaders refuse to accept a 15½ cents an hour wage increase retroactive to November 1, 1947. This increase was recommended by an impartial Emergency Board appointed by President Truman.

This increase of 15½ cents already has been accepted by the 19 other railroad unions. But the Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers, the Brotherhood of Locomotive Fremen and Engineers, and the Switchmen's Union of North America won't accept what more than 190% of all railroad employes have accepted. They have called a strike to get more! after hearing evidence for 33 days, made recommendations based on all the facts in the case. The railroads have accepted these recommendations.

recommended them! These union leaders
lave refund to negotiate except upon these
arbitrary terms.

Engineers and firemen are among the highest paid of all employes in America, as figures in the box show. This strike threat doesn't justify giving a greater increase than other railroad workers received.

Entergency Boards are a means provided by the Enlivery Labor Act in the public interest to good strikes. The President's Board, You will be the victim!

How long will the American public stand for the undemocratic, arbitrary, and abusive use of the right to strike and the disregard of the obligation to provide transportation? How long can the American people permit a few dictatorial union leaders to dety the processes provided for pear-eful settlement of disputes? ef disputes?

Ferce seldom produces settlements that are either fair er lasting. Moreover, a point is often reached when personal interests must be held subordinate to the greater public welfare. That is why the railroads have accepted the Emergency Board recommendations. That is also why the leaders of these three unions should reconsider their decision to call a paralyzing strike. Although they deplored so large an entra cost burden, the railroads accepted the report of the Board because they felt it was in the pub-lic interest to uphold the spirit and intent of the Railway Labor Act.



Tie Up Tomatoes for Big Yield in Small Garden IT TAKES A LOT OF



Favorite vegetable with Freedom gardeners is the tomato. A survey made by the U. S. Department of agriculture proved that nine out of ten amateurs grow it.

When plants are allowed to sprawing on the ground they occupy too much space for many small gardens; but when grown to a single stem, tied to a stake or similar support, the marimum crop can be harvested for the space occupyled.

Single stem plants can be spaced a foot apart, and double stem plants 21 inches apart, while plants that lie on the ground require four feet each way.

This applies to varieties of normal vine growth, which are the only kind that should be staked and pruned. So-called determinate varieties, of which the stems stop growing after they reach a certain length, while the plant devotes all its energies to ripening the finit which has set should never be pruned, and get moberefit from staking, but they may be planted as closely as 18 inches apart, and allowed to spread on the ground. They bear a good early crop, but over a shorter season than the older, later varieties.

Keeping tomato plants pruned and tied to stakes or a fence needs constant attention. At the joint where each leaf grows on the main stem, a branch will develop, and this must be cut or prached off before it is four inches long, otherwise its removal may weaken the plant. If allowed to scale noist,
