On May 2nd the United States Supreme Court held that covenants which barred Negroes, and members of other racial groups, from purchasing, leasing, or selling property in "restricted" neighborhoods. This ruling knocks the best out of restrictive covenants which relied on enforcement by state courts for their effectiveness.

On August 20th Negroes in South Carolina voted freely for the first time.

The Urban League reports that the Ford Motor Plant in Atlanta has promised that "there would be no discrimination in terms of hiring; that men would be used to their full capacity; and that the plant would be a place where all men could find a job."—an indication that ability, not color or race, is becoming more and more the employment standard in America.

## ...Editorial... WANTED: SAFETY LEADERS

A majority of the people of the United States are not only unaware of the extent of the annual accident toll in life and property, but are not organized to do anything about it, maintains Julien H. Harvey, manager of the Accident Prevention Department, Association of Casualty and Surety Companies. He scored the American public for dangerous indifference toward its own safety.

Approximately 1,000,000 persons meet accidental death every decade. Proof enough, says Mr. Harvey, of public apathy. "Safety has never been taken seriously as a desirable national objective by large segments of the American public."

Stressing the need for uniform accident prevention measures on a nationwide scale, he warned that "we cannot pin our hopes on scattered and inadequate remedial measures that promise much but actually contribute little."

"A major reason for public indifference may be partially explained through the inclination of national and state governments to take their cue from public misdirection and fail to manifest a thorough and continuous interest in the problem with the appearance of activity," he said.

He charged that many public officials have often been content with "the appearance of activity" rather than with the establishment of effective, continuous measures.

Mr. Harvey stressed the importance of safety training in primary and secondary schools, "because the schools' responsibility for conditioning the on-coming generations to the hazards of modern living is quite as great as any other responsibilities that they are called upon to discharge. In the nature of the accident problem, no other single agency can do quite as much for a permanent solution as the schools and colleges."

Mr. Harvey called for vigorous leadership on the part of public school officials in the interest of continuous accident prevention training for youths.
