

it, and when we aren't sure whether we're less afraid of the future than we were a year ago, or more so. The curious thing about the govern-ment's exhortation to us to spend is that the exhorters know how we feel and how we're situated; they know our old conviction in favor of

thriftiness and they agree with that conviction—and yet these same exhorters ask us to buy, buy, buy!


What's the answer? Money is a means of trade. If you had a cord
