LEADERS FEEL CONFIDENT OF VOTE VICTORY

But Heavy Voting Next Tuesday Would Surprise Many

CANDIDATES HAVE PRESENTED ISSUES

Leaders of both the Democratic and Republican forces in the borough are confident of victory when the voters cast their ballots next Tuesday. Asked to comment on the coming election next Tuesday, Theodore S. Barker, Republican leader, remarked today, "I would say that there is no doubt in my mind whatever of a substantial Republican majority, provided really large vote is cast."

Girl Runs in Front of Car; Nose and Leg Are Fractured

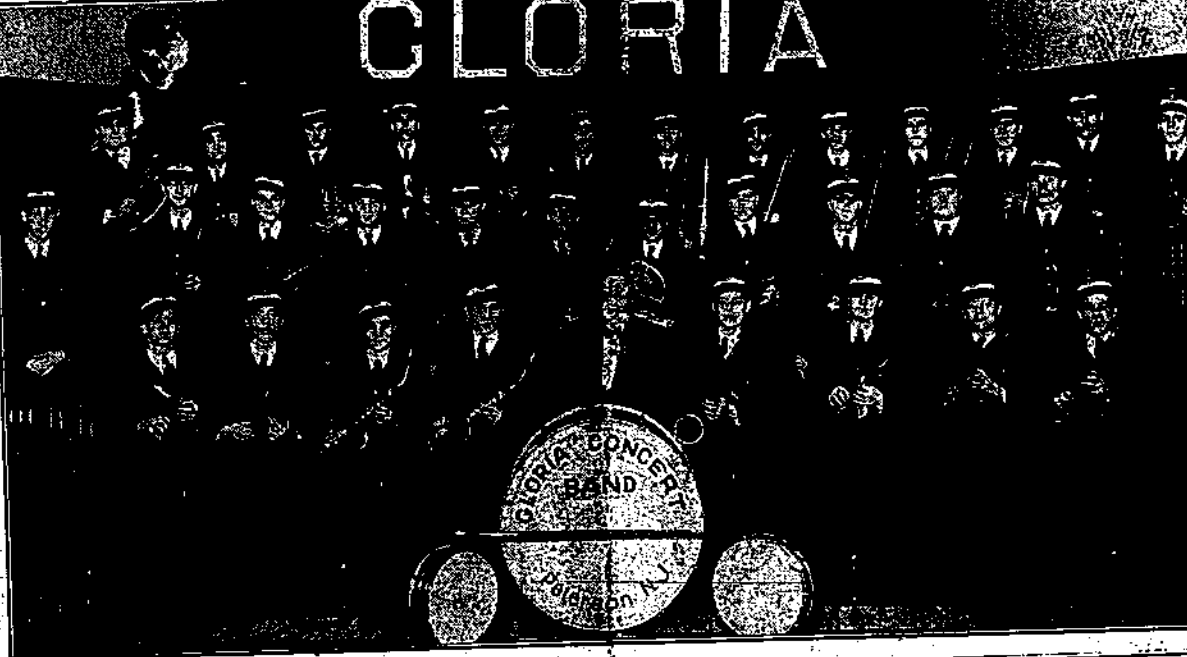
