RAID OVER HAWTHORNE

On November 30, next Tuesday, at the General Election the citizens of Hawthorne will have the opportunity to determine whether there will be a raid on the municipal treasury. Unlike the Orson Welles "Radio War"—the raid will not be fake if the citizenry decide to vote for the Civil Service Referendum.

We urge the people of Hawthorne to VOTE NO on the Civil Service Referendum for the following reasons:

1. Hawthorne has several unqualified jobholders on the municipal payroll.
2. Some Borough employees are not qualified for their work.
3. Some Borough employees are paid too much and would continue to be paid too much for the service they render.
4. All employees would hold their jobs for life without taking a competitive test.
5. All present employees are the selection of political "has-beens" who have been disgraced in public office.
6. One employee with a criminal record would receive a life time job.
7. May, 1939, is the Borough Commissioner's election and the people should have an opportunity to approve or disapprove the methods of the present commissioners.
8. No one—not even the Civil Service authorities—has given a complete list of the local employees who will be protected.
9. The people of Hawthorne have not had enough time to study this complex problem that was first given publicity five short weeks ago.

We regret that some old employees will not get protection if Civil Service is defeated as it should be. However, we are of the opinion that the best interest of the people of the Borough of Hawthorne will be served if you vote NO on the Civil Service Referendum to keep political stogons out of permanent jobs for life.

UP TO VOTERS—READ BALLOTS CAREFULLY

All Passaic County voters should take great interest in the referendum which will be held at next Tuesday's election on the question of authorizing maintenance funds for The Passaic County Park Commission.

In our estimation the referendum affords an opportunity for Hawthorne to place a stamp of approval upon the splendid accomplishments of this board. Less than a dozen years ago there was a danger that desirable lands for park purposes would be absorbed in one fashion or another. Today we have a well developed park system comprising five units and 1,200 acres of ground. Considerable work has been carried on during these past few years and as a result this county may well feel proud of its park.

The Park Commission now has reached the point where a maintenance fund must be set up in order to preserve the large investment that has been made during the past decade. Unless this is done the public will lose the value of all the fine work that has been done in developing the parks.

Particularly in Hawthorne, where Goffe Brook Park has blossomed forth this fall and taken shape as a park, the maintenance requirements must be met or there will be a problem if the referendum is not adopted so that the park commissioners will be assured of sufficient funds to keep it in shape.

By its past record we have full confidence in the Park Commission. It has made a public pledge not to exceed \$60,000 a year during the next three years. We know the authorities are sincere and they have proven their ability. We say vote "Yes" on the question.
