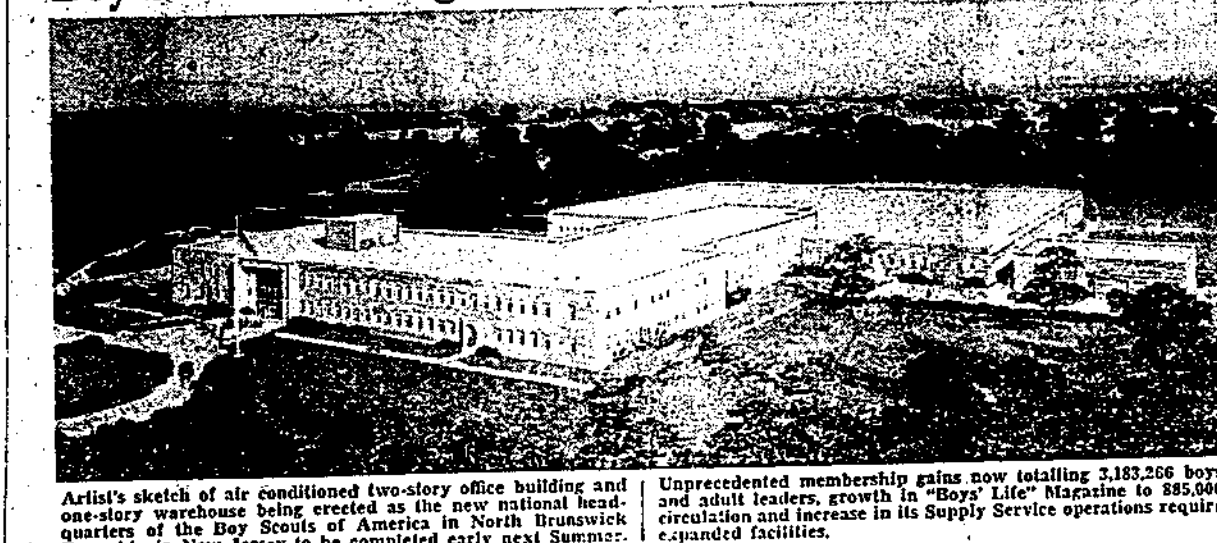

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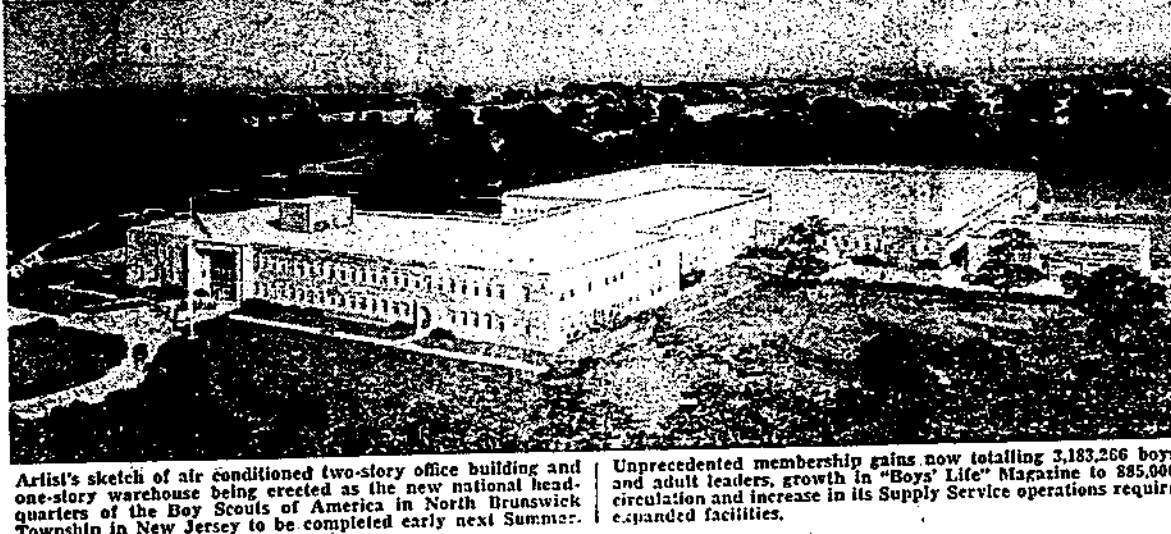

The lead of one of our leading corporations recently

employed than ever before, and the highest wages in history.

He said further: "The kind of America we live in tomorrow

The Children's Home Society of New Jersey, which relies on private donations for the maintenance of its program, has for many years been in a financial straits. Logically, this cannot go on indefinitely, and we must look to our friends in all parts of the state for greater support for our current activities.

In making a plea for increased support in behalf of the Society's activities for 1951, Mrs. Ott said, "Our organization has a deficit of approximately \$500.00 for each child we place in adoption. It would seem that this is a small sum in the light of the fact that by putting a homeless youngster with a new family we save him or her from becoming a public charge. Accordingly, it makes good sense for interested persons in each community to do what they can to aid our work."

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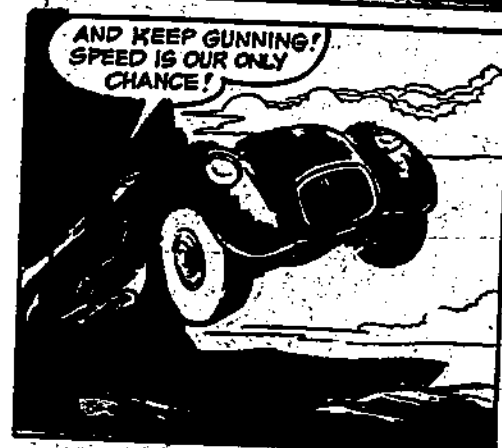

Some Argument!

Some advocates of socialist electric power development have come up with a new and astonishing argument. New England people have long been critical of the Tennessee Valley Authority, on the sound grounds that TVA's tax-free, tax-subsidized electric power leads to unfair competition with New England industries. But, instead of demanding that TVA be forced to operate on a business basis as does the government electric industry, many New Englanders are asking that the government establish a power authority on the TVA model in their area and subsidize their electricity in the same fashion. Thus, in effect, they are arguing that the way to solve the problem of tax subsidies is to have more tax subsidies!

A related argument is being used in the controversy over a \$400,000 power project at Niagara Falls. A group of private New York utilities wants to undertake this huge job, and the House of Representatives passed a bill authorizing them to do so. However, powerful political interests are trying to block private development, and to have the project built by New York State. And one of their points is that if the state produces the power it will be tax-free, whereas it would be taxed under private development. Therefore, the argument continues, the state could sell it cheaper!

Carrying this argument to its only logical end, the government should produce everything we use—because government doesn't have to pay taxes and so could sell everything for a lower price. What isn't made clear is where the money to support government would come from in this event.

From the end of October through November, your chances of catching a really big fish are at least 25 times better than in summer. Maybe even 50. Fish now don't call for special skill nor a knowledge of how to land good ones because the fish are running widely, seeking at the food they can find.

Usually water of about 50 to 60 degrees is the best for now, and trolling anywhere within these depths you are likely to pick one up. Give special attention to the neighborhood of reefs, small islands and towards the ends of long points.

You won't need any special tackle but be sure your line is good condition. The test line is one depends largely on your experience in handling big fish and on how hooked you are when things happen suddenly. Among guides and other experienced anglers, 10-pound test is the second choice, and for money and large pick. On a reel that has a drag, it is a good idea to use a 10-pound test line. But the less experienced man whose reel has no drag should use a heavier line, say 15-pound test, eight inches in diameter, but you can use slightly break or the hook straighten.

Know Your Heart

Prepared by the N. J. Heart Association

(Second in a Series by the New Jersey Heart Association) Despite all that you may have heard to the contrary, exercise does not damage a healthy heart. Many people with normal hearts are afraid that strenuous exercise may enlarge their hearts, or may cause heart murmurs. Neither is true.

Enlargement of the heart may come from an injury to the valves which makes the heart work harder to maintain the usual flow of blood, and possibly from extreme overwork. It is only from supporting a continuous added burden over long periods of time that the heart will enlarge, never from increased activity in the relatively short amount of time devoted to any exercise.

The increased rate of the heart's beat during exercise occasionally will produce a murmur, but this is just a normal accompaniment of the speed-up in tempo. Permanent heart murmurs, when they do exist, are not the result of exercise.

Scientifically, this does not mean that a man who has spent most of his life in an office should suddenly decide to become a professional athlete. But it does mean that any healthy individual can engage in exercise which is in line with his age, without worrying about harming his heart.

Many people today, aware of heart disease's frightening toll, become unnecessarily alarmed by symptoms which they believe to be indications of heart trouble. Medical research, financed by contributions to the annual Heart Fund appeal, has discovered that many of these symptoms are harmless. The next column in this series will describe these symptoms and explain their real significance.

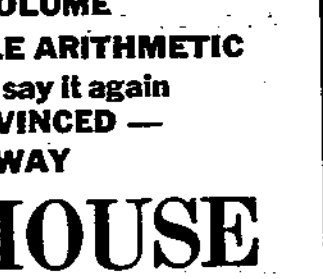
