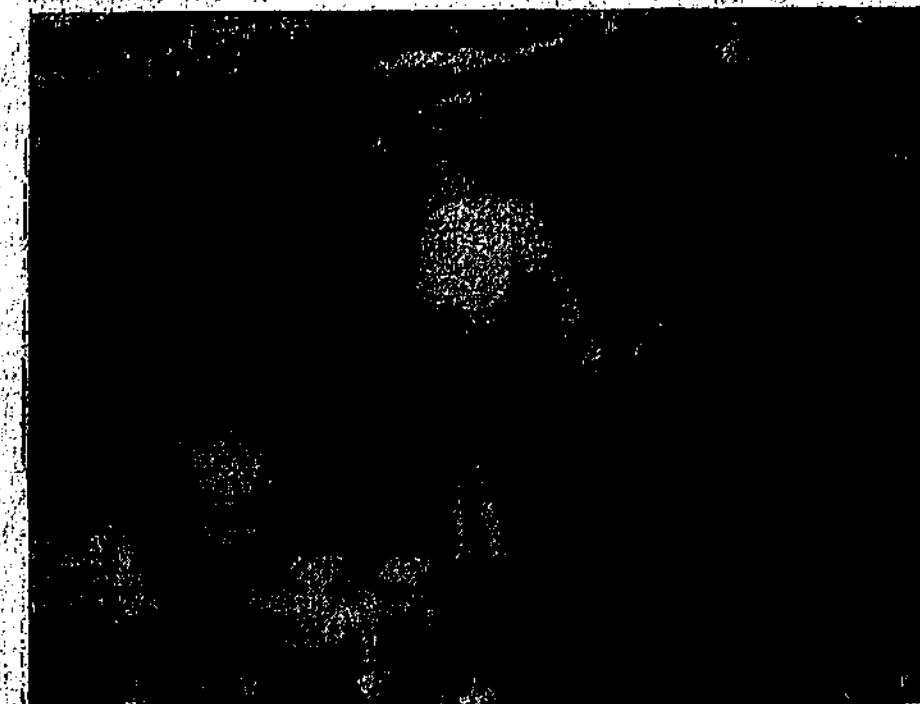

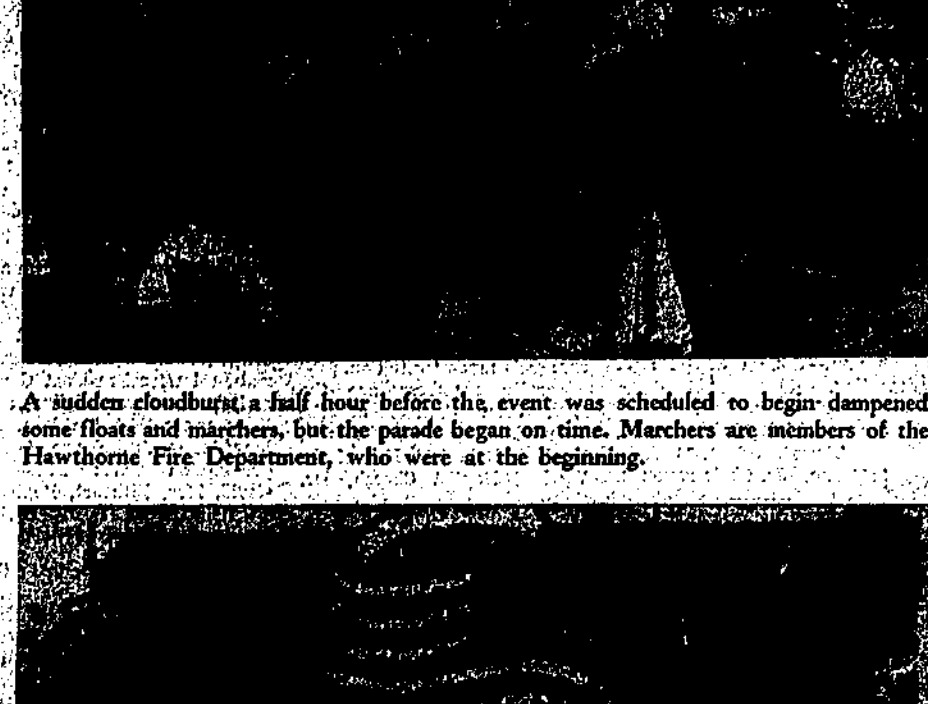
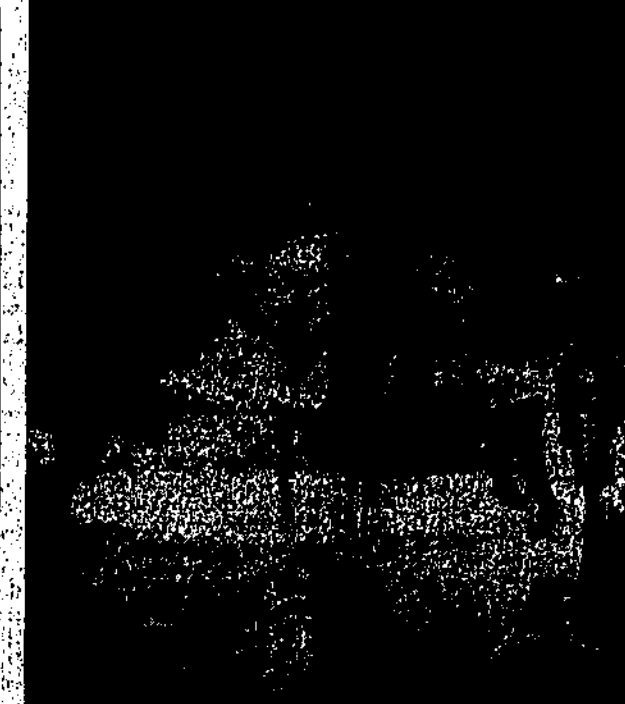

For the first time in history the Hawthorne Caballeros became the only corps to win the world championship for two consecutive years. The Cabs beat out 11 other senior corps of the Drum Corps Association world championships at Kean Stadium, Rutherford, N. J. on Sunday, Sept. 2.

The first band in Monday's 70th anniversary parade, the Hawthorne Caballeros, announced the news of the world title as they carried a banner reading "Congratulations World Champion Caballeros."

The Caballeros, who were the very last group in the parade, displayed their winning trophies for the entire borough to see. Thousands of spectators cheered the group and congratulated them on their victory.

Parents want guard at Warburton, Police chief says one to be there today

Lafayette Avenue and Warburton Avenue is a well known intersection in this borough. To most residents, it's the scene of the municipal building, the police station and ambulance garage. To the school children, it's a neighborhood detour and a popular lunch spot. To a group of parents in the area from Arlington Avenue to Brookside over to Westland Avenue, whose children were transferred from Franklin to Lincoln School in the recent redistricting, the four-way crossing is a dangerous intersection for a child to cross without a crossing guard.

Since the first day of school last Wednesday, about 25 parents have been to the Board of Commissioners, the school administrator, the police chief and Tuesday night attended a meeting of the Bd. of Education. At their first, emergency meeting, Mayor Louis Bay, 2nd, related that a study of the crossing conditions is being made to determine whether guards should be at the intersection and also at the intersection of Lincoln School.

The Press contacted Police Chief Charles F. Kruppa, Jr. yesterday afternoon and he reported that as of today the crossing guard would be transferred to this location. "When school begins, the crossing guard will remain here until further notice."

One junior patrol student will remain at this location and another would be assigned to the railroad tracks on Grand Avenue. A police officer will make a survey at Garden Avenue. Robert and YACAB will also be set up to check reports of speeding on Rock Road.

The police chief also indicated they want the number of students who are crossing the street to be taken waiting to get a true picture.

CROSSING GUARD NEEDED AT WARBURTON

Back in our June 21 issue, we wrote an editorial recommending a committee be formed to resolve the school crossing situation prior to September. Instead on opening day, a survey was begun to determine where children need assistance as a result of school redistricting.

We never received any formal education in the field of public safety, but common sense tells us you can't expect a 5, 6 or 7 year old to cross without assistance, in order to make a survey of actual conditions. And a survey of how many kids are walking isn't accurate, if some parents are driving kids to school, because there is no crossing guard.

We're puzzled about taking a count. It has already been determined that some 27 kids cross at this intersection. A few more or less doesn't make any difference, if the street is a busy corner.

Placing a crossing guard at Warburton is what should have been done in the first place. An adult guard was scheduled for duty there today.

We hope it's a permanent decision.

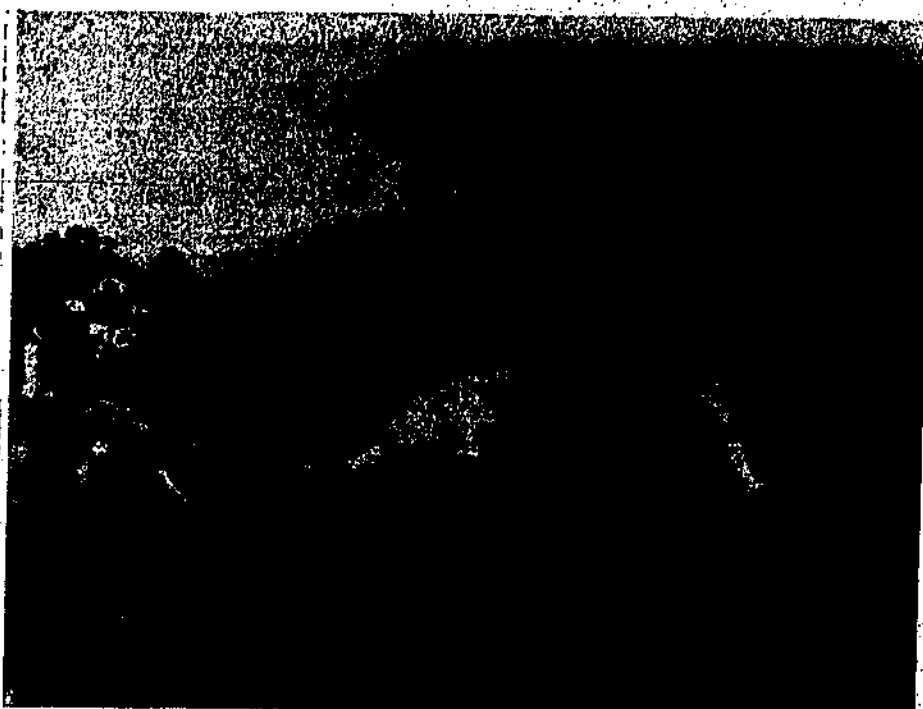
