Jake Baum of the same company added, "The money is in the budget, so it's no loss."

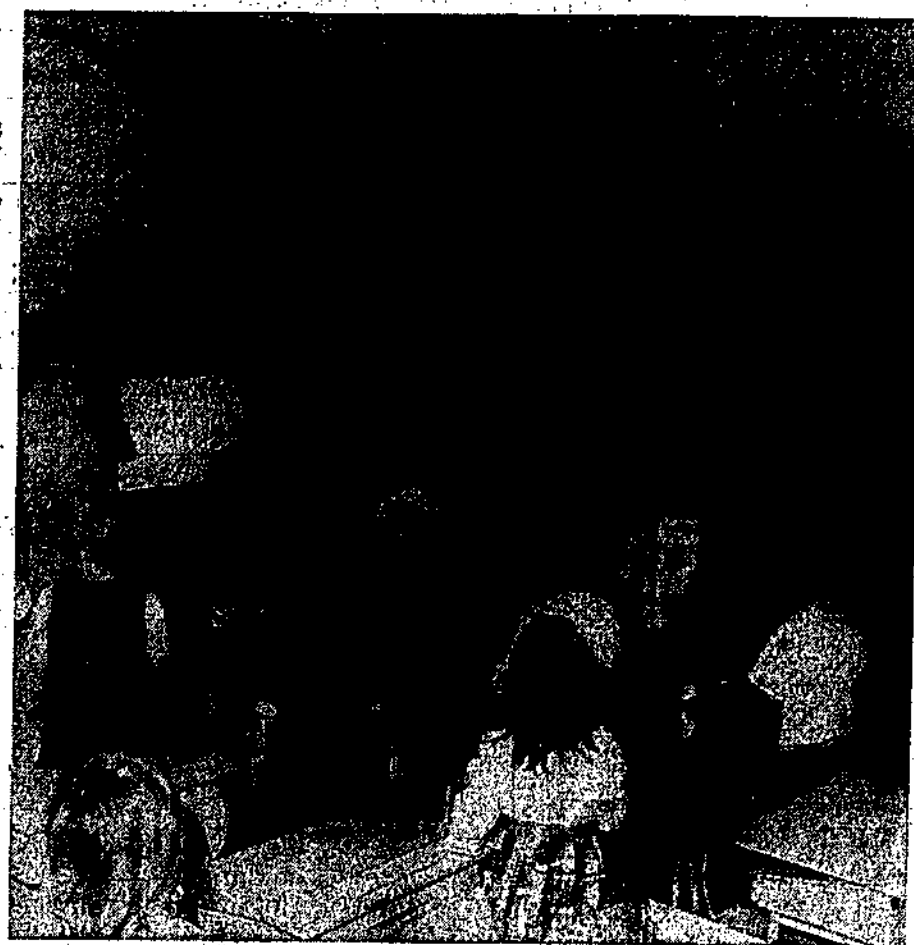
Bill Marione came back into the discussion. "This isn't a done deal. First, a resolution should be drawn up and sent to the mayor to get it set up legally."

The tenth annual Road & Auto Show will be held Sunday, September 8 on Grand Avenue in the borough. The display will feature antique, classic and custom vehicles.
